AN ACT concerning social welfare; Kansas department for children and 1 2 families: eligibility requirements for assistance: amending K.S.A. 17-2263, 17-5828, 39-709b, 59-1301 and 59-3504 and K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 3 9-1215, 9-1216, 16-311, 17-2264, 17-5829, 39-702, 39-709, 39-709c, 4 5 39-753, 39-756a, 59-2222, 59-2247, 59-2801 and 59-3086 and 6 repealing the existing sections; also repealing K.S.A. 39-7,101, 39-7 7,106, 39-7,107, 39-7,110 and 75-5364 and K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 39-7,102, 39-7,103, 39-7,104, 39-7,105, 39-7,108, 39-7,109 and 39-7,122. 8

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10 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 9-1215 is hereby amended to read as 11 12 follows: 9-1215. Subject to the provisions of this section and K.S.A. 9-1216, and amendments thereto, an individual adult or minor, hereafter 13 14 referred to as the owner, may enter into a written contract with any bank 15 located in this state providing that the balance of the owner's deposit account, or the balance of the owner's legal share of a deposit account, at 16 17 the time of death of the owner shall be made payable on the death of the 18 owner to one or more persons or, if the persons predecease the owner, to 19 another person or persons, hereafter referred to as the beneficiary or 20 beneficiaries. If any beneficiary is a minor at the time the account, or any portion of the account, becomes payable to the beneficiary and the 21 22 balance, or portion of the balance, exceeds the amount specified by K.S.A. 23 59-3053, and amendments thereto, the moneys shall be payable only to a 24 conservator of the minor beneficiary.

Transfers pursuant to this section shall not be considered testamentary or be invalidated due to nonconformity with the provisions of chapter 59 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, *and amendments thereto*.

28 Every contract authorized by this section shall be considered to contain 29 a right on the part of the owner during the owner's lifetime both to 30 withdraw funds on deposit in the account in the manner provided in the 31 contract, in whole or in part, as though no beneficiary has been named, and 32 to change the designation of beneficiary. The interest of the beneficiary 33 shall be considered not to vest until the death of the owner and, if there is a 34 claim pursuant to subsection (g) of K.S.A. 39-709, and amendments 35 thereto, until such claim is satisfied.

36 No change in the designation of the beneficiary shall be valid unless

executed in the form and manner prescribed by the bank and delivered to
 the bank prior to the death of the owner.

For the purposes of this section, the balance of the owner's deposit account or the balance of the owner's legal share of a deposit account shall not be construed to include any portion of the account which under the law of joint tenancy is the property of another joint tenant of the account upon the death of the owner.

8 As used in this section, "person" means any individual, individual or 9 corporate fiduciary or nonprofit religious or charitable organization as 10 defined by K.S.A. 79-4701, and amendments thereto.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 9-1216 is hereby amended to read as 11 12 follows: 9-1216. When the owner and the bank have entered into a contract authorized in K.S.A. 9-1215, and amendments thereto, the 13 owner's deposit account subject to the contract or any part of or interest on 14 the account shall be paid by the bank to the owner or pursuant to the 15 16 owner's order during the owner's lifetime. On the owner's death, the 17 deposit account or any part of or interest on the account shall be paid by 18 the bank to the secretary for children and families for a claim pursuant to subsection (g) of K.S.A. 39-709, and amendments thereto, or, if there is no 19 20 such claim or if any portion of the account remains after such claim is 21 satisfied, to the designated beneficiary or beneficiaries. If any designated 22 beneficiary is a minor at the time the account, or any portion of the 23 account, becomes payable to the beneficiary and the balance, or portion of 24 the balance, exceeds the amount specified by K.S.A. 59-3053, and 25 amendments thereto, the bank shall pay the moneys or any interest on 26 them only to a conservator of the minor beneficiary. The receipt of the 27 conservator shall release and discharge the bank for the payment.

28 Sec. 3. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 16-311 is hereby amended to read as 29 follows: 16-311. (a) Whenever a person, who is or has been a recipient of 30 medical assistance from the Kansas department for children and families, 31 enters into a prearranged funeral agreement, contract or plan pursuant to 32 K.S.A. 16-301, and amendments thereto, or a prearranged funeral 33 agreement, contract or plan funded by insurance proceeds, such person 34 shall inform the secretary for children and families or the secretary's 35 designee of the existence of such an agreement, contract or plan and shall 36 inform the funeral establishment that such person is or has been a recipient 37 of medical assistance.

(b) If any balance remains after payment for the final disposition of a dead human body, or for funeral or burial services, or funeral or burial merchandise, and the purchaser of the agreement, contract, or plan is or has been a recipient of medical assistance or a deceased surviving spouse of a recipient of medical assistance, any remaining balance shall be paid according to K.S.A. 16-304, and amendments thereto, or if such

1 agreement, contract or plan was funded by insurance, any remaining balance shall be paid by the insurance company or the person, association, 2 3 partnership, firm or corporation providing the services or merchandise to 4 the secretary for children and families or the secretary's designee, to the 5 extent of medical assistance expended on the deceased recipient. The 6 insurance company or the person, association, partnership, firm or 7 corporation providing the services or merchandise shall not be liable to the 8 Kansas department for children and families for the balance in the account 9 if written notice has not been received stating that medical assistance has 10 been expended on the recipient for which the Kansas department for children and families may have a claim, and the balance of the account has 11 12 been paid to the estate of the deceased or in the case of insurance, the 13 designated beneficiary.

14 (c) Payments to the secretary for children and families under 15 subsection (b) and K.S.A. 16-304, and amendments thereto, shall be 16 governed by subsection (g)(2) of K.S.A. 39-709, and amendments thereto.

When the shareholder and the credit union have entered 11 into a contract authorized in K.S.A. 17-2263, and amendments thereto, the 12 13 shareholder's account subject to the contract or any part of or interest on the account shall be paid by the credit union to the shareholder or pursuant 14 to the shareholder's order during the shareholder's lifetime. On the 15 16 shareholder's death, the deposit account or any part of or interest on the 17 account shall be paid by the credit union to the secretary for children and families for a claim pursuant to-subsection (g) of K.S.A. 39-709, and 18 19 amendments thereto, or, if there is no such claim or if any portion of the 20 account remains after such claim is satisfied, to the designated beneficiary 21 or beneficiaries. 22 Sec. 7. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 17-5829 is hereby amended to read as 23 follows: 17-5829. When the owner and the savings and loan association 24 have entered into a contract authorized in K.S.A. 17-5828, and 25 amendments thereto, the owner's deposit account subject to the contract or any part of or interest on the account shall be paid by the savings and loan 26 27 association to the owner or pursuant to the owner's order during the 28 owner's lifetime. On the owner's death, the deposit account or any part of 29 or interest on the account may be paid by the savings and loan association 30 to the secretary for children and families for a claim pursuant to subsection 31 (g) of K.S.A. 39-709, and amendments thereto, or, if there is no such claim 32 or if any portion of the account remains after such claim is satisfied, to the designated beneficiary or beneficiaries. If any designated beneficiary is a 33 34 minor at the time the account, or any portion of the account, becomes 35 payable to the beneficiary and the balance, or portion of the balance, 36 exceeds the amount specified by K.S.A. 59-3053, and amendments 37 thereto, the savings and loan association shall pay the moneys or any 38 interest on them only to a conservator of the minor beneficiary. 41 Sec. 8. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 39-702 is hereby amended to read as 42 follows: 39-702. The following words and phrases when used in this act 43 shall, for the purposes of this act, have the meanings respectively ascribed 1 to them in this section:

2 (a) "Secretary" means the secretary for children and families, unless3 otherwise specified.

4 (b) "Applicants" means all persons who, as individuals, or in whose 5 behalf requests are made of the secretary for aid or assistance.

6 (c) "Social welfare service" may include such functions as giving 7 assistance, the prevention of public dependency, and promoting the 8 rehabilitation of dependent persons or those who are approaching public 9 dependency.

10 "Assistance" includes such items or functions as the giving or (d) providing of money, food stamps or coupons assistance, food, clothing, 11 12 shelter, medicine or other materials, the giving of any service, including instructive or scientific, and the providing of institutional care, which may 13 14 be necessary or helpful to the recipient in providing the necessities of life 15 for the recipient and the recipient's dependents. The definitions of social 16 welfare service and assistance in this section shall be deemed as partially 17 descriptive and not limiting.

18 (e) "Aid to families with dependent children *Temporary assistance to* 19 *needy families*" means financial assistance with respect to or on behalf of a 20 dependent child or dependent children and includes financial assistance for 21 any month to meet the needs of the relative *or qualifying caretaker* with 22 whom any dependent child is living.

(f) "Medical assistance" means the payment of all or part of the cost 23 24 of necessary: (1) Medical, remedial, rehabilitative or preventive care and 25 services which are within the scope of services to be provided under a medical care plan developed by the secretary pursuant to this act and 26 27 furnished by health care providers who have a current approved provider 28 agreement with the secretary; and (2) transportation to obtain care and 29 services which are within the scope of services to be provided under a 30 medical care plan developed by the secretary pursuant to this act.

31 (g) "Dependent children" means needy children under the age of 18, 32 or who are under the age of 19 and are full-time students in secondary 33 schools or the equivalent educational program-or are full-time students in a 34 program of vocational or technical training if they may be reasonably-35 expected to complete the training before attaining age 19, who have been 36 deprived of parental or guardian support or care by reasons of the death, 37 continued absence from the home, or physical or mental incapacity who 38 are in the care of a biological or adoptive parent-or, court appointed 39 guardian, conservator or legal custodian and who are living with any 40 blood relative, including those of the half-blood, and including first 41 cousins, uncles, aunts, and persons of preceding generations are denoted 42 by prefixes of grand, great, or great-great, and including the spouses or 43 former spouses of any persons named in the above groups, in a place of

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1 residence maintained by one or more of such relatives as their own home.

2 The secretary may adopt rules and regulations which extend the-3 deprivation requirement under this definition to include being deprived of 4 parental or guardian support or care by reason of the unemployment of a 5 parent or guardian. The term "dependent children" also includes children 6 who would meet the foregoing requirements except for their removal from 7 the home of a relative as a result of judicial determination to the effect that 8 continuation therein would be contrary to the welfare of such children, for 9 whose placement and care the secretary is responsible, who have been-10 placed in a foster family home or child care institution as a result of such determination and who received aid to dependent children in or for the 11 12 month in which court proceedings leading to such determination wereinitiated, or would have received such aid in or for such month if-13 application had been made therefor, or in the case of a child who had been 14 15 living with a relative specified above within six months prior to the month 16 in which such proceedings were initiated, would have received such aid in 17 or for such month if in such month such child had been living with and removed from the home of such a relative and application had been made 18 19 therefor.

(h) "The blind" means not only those who are totally and permanently
 devoid of vision, but also those persons whose vision is so defective as to
 prevent the performance of ordinary activities for which eyesight is
 essential.

(i) "General assistance" means financial assistance in which the cost
 of such financial assistance is not participated in by the federal government. General assistance may be limited to transitional assistance in
 some instances as specified by rules and regulations adopted by the
 secretary.

(j)—"Recipient" means a person who has received assistance under the
 terms of this act.

31 (k)(j) "Intake office" means the place where the secretary shall 32 maintain an office for receiving applications.

33 (1) (k) "Adequate consideration" means consideration equal, or 34 reasonably proportioned to the value of that for which it is given.

(m) "Transitional assistance" means a form of general assistance in
 which as little financial assistance as one payment may be made during
 each period of 12 consecutive calendar months to an eligible and needy
 person and all other persons for whom such person is legally responsible.

39 (n)(l) "Title IV-D" means part D of title IV of the federal social
 40 security act (42 U.S.C. § 651 et seq.), as in effect on May 1, 1997.

(m) "TANF diversion"—assistance" means a one-time voluntary
payment option in lieu of ongoing TANF assistance. The diversion
payment is available to applicants who have not received TANF assistance

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1 as an adult, and is designed to meet a crisis or emergency hardship that 2 would endanger such applicants' ability to remain employed or to accept 3 an offer of employment. Any household that includes such recipient 4 accepting the diversion payment is ineligible to receive on-going TANF 5 assistance for 12 months after receipt of the diversion payment. Any 6 recipient who receives a diversion payment is limited to 42 months of 7 TANF cash assistance in a lifetime, unless such recipient shall meet a 8 hardship criteria as defined by the secretary.

9 (n) "Non-cooperation" means the failure of the applicant or recipient 10 to comply with all requirements provided in state and federal law, rules 11 and regulations and agency policy.

Sec. 9. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 39-709 is hereby amended to read as follows: 39-709. (a) *General eligibility requirements for assistance for which federal moneys are expended*. Subject to the additional requirements below, assistance in accordance with plans under which federal moneys are expended may be granted to any needy person who:

17 (1) Has insufficient income or resources to provide a reasonable 18 subsistence compatible with decency and health. Where a husband and 19 wife or cohabiting partners are living together, the combined income or 20 resources of both shall be considered in determining the eligibility of 21 either or both for such assistance unless otherwise prohibited by law. The 22 secretary, in determining need of any applicant for or recipient of 23 assistance shall not take into account the financial responsibility of any 24 individual for any applicant or recipient of assistance unless such applicant 25 or recipient is such individual's spouse, *cohabiting partner* or such 26 individual's minor child or minor stepchild if the stepchild is living with 27 such individual. The secretary in determining need of an individual may 28 provide such income and resource exemptions as may be permitted by 29 federal law. For purposes of eligibility for aid for families with dependent 30 ehildren temporary assistance for needy families, for food-stamp-31 assistance and for any other assistance provided through the Kansas 32 department for children and families under which federal moneys are 33 expended, the secretary for children and families shall consider one motor 34 vehicle owned by the applicant for assistance, regardless of the value of 35 such vehicle, as exempt personal property and shall consider any equity in 36 any boat, personal water craft, recreational vehicle, recreational off-37 highway vehicle or all-terrain vehicle, as defined by K.S.A. 8-126, and 38 amendments thereto, or any additional motor vehicle owned by the 39 applicant for assistance to be a nonexempt resource of the applicant for 40 assistance except that any additional motor vehicle used by the applicant, the applicant's spouse or the applicant's cohabiting partner 41 42 for the primary purpose of earning income may be considered as 43 exempt personal property in the secretary's discretion.

(2) Is a citizen of the United States or is an alien lawfully admitted to 1 2 the United States and who is residing in the state of Kansas.

(b) Temporary assistance for needy families. Assistance may be 3 granted under this act to any dependent child, or relative, subject to the 4 general eligibility requirements as set out in subsection (a), who resides in 5 6 the state of Kansas or whose parent or other relative with whom the child 7 is living resides in the state of Kansas. Such assistance shall be known as 8 temporary assistance for needy families. Where the husband and wife or cohabiting partners are living together, both shall register for work under 9 the program requirements for temporary assistance for needy families in 10 accordance with criteria and guidelines prescribed by rules and 11 12 regulations of the secretary.

(1) As used in this subsection, "family group" or "household" means 13 the applicant or recipient for TANF, child care subsidy or employment 14 services and all individuals living together in which there is a relationship 15 16 of legal responsibility or a qualifying caretaker relationship. This will include a cohabiting boyfriend or girlfriend living with the person legally 17 responsible for the child. The family group shall not be eligible for 18 19 TANF if the family group contains at least one adult member who has received TANF, including the federal TANF assistance received in any 20 other state, for-48 36 calendar months beginning on and after October 1, 21 22 1996, unless the secretary determines a hardship exists and grants an 23 extension allowing receipt of TANF until the 60-month 48-month limit is reached. No extension beyond-60 48 months shall be granted. Hardship 24 25 provisions for a recipient include:

(A) Is a caretaker of a disabled family member living in the 26 27 household:

28 (B) has a disability which precludes employment on a long-term 29 basis or requires substantial rehabilitation;

30 (C) needs a time limit extension to overcome the effects of domestic 31 violence/sexual assault;

32 (D) is involved with prevention and protection services (PPS) and 33 has an open social service plan; or

(E) is determined by the 48^{th} 36th month to have an extreme hardship 34 35 other than what is designated in criteria listed in subparagraphs (A) 36 through (E). This determination will be made by the executive review 37 team.

38 (2) All adults applying for TANF shall be required to complete a 39 work program assessment as specified by the Kansas department for children and families, including those who have been disqualified for or 40 denied TANF due to non-cooperation, drug testing requirements or fraud. 41 Adults who are not otherwise eligible for TANF, such as ineligible aliens, 42 relative/non-relative caretakers and adults receiving supplemental security 43

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income are not required to complete the assessment process. During the 1

application processing period, applicants must complete at least one 2

module or its equivalent of the work program assessment to be considered 3 eligible for TANF benefits, unless good cause is found to be exempt from 4

the requirements. Good cause exemptions shall only include: 5

The applicant can document an existing certification verifying 6 (A) 7 completion of the work program assessment;

8 (B) the applicant has a valid offer of employment or is employed a 9 minimum of 20 hours a week;

10 (C) the applicant is a parenting teen without a GED or high school 11 diploma; 12

(D)the applicant is enrolled in job corps;

the applicant is working with a refugee social services agency; 13 (E)14 and or

the applicant has completed the work program assessment within 15 (F)16 the last 12 months.

17 (3) The department for children and families shall maintain a sufficient level of dedicated work program staff to enable the agency to 18 19 conduct work program case management services to TANF recipients in a timely manner and in full accordance with state law and agency policy. 20

(4) TANF mandatory work program applicants and recipients shall 21 participate in work components that lead to competitive, integrated 22 employment. Components are defined by the federal government as being 23 either primary or secondary. In order to meet federal work participation 24 requirements, households need to meet at least 30 hours of participation 25 per week, at least 20 hours of which need to be primary and at least 10 26 hours may be secondary components. The following components meet 27 federal definitions of primary hours of participation: Full or part-time 28 employment, apprenticeship, work study, self-employment, job corps, 29 subsidized employment, work experience sites, on-the-job training, 30 supervised community service, vocational education, job search and job 31 readiness. Secondary components include: Job skills training, education 32 directly related to employment such as adult basic education and English 33 as a second language, and completion of a high school diploma or GED. 34

(5) A parent or other adult caretaker personally providing care for a 35 child under the age of three months in their TANF household is exempt 36 37 from work participation activities until the month the child turns three 38 months of age. The three-month period is defined as two consecutive 39 months starting with the month after childbirth. The exemption for caring for a child under three months cannot be claimed: 40

(A) By either parent when two parents are in the home and the 41 household meets the two-parent definition for federal reporting purposes; 42

(B) by one parent or caretaker when the other parent or caretaker is 43

1 in the home, and available, capable and suitable to provide care and the

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2 household does not meet the two-parent definition for federal reporting
3 purposes;

4 (C) by a person age 19 or younger when such person is pregnant or a 5 parent of a child in the home and the person does not possess a high 6 school diploma or its equivalent. Such person shall become exempt the 7 month such person turns age 20;

8 (D) by any adult in the TANF assistance plan when at least one adult 9 has reached the 36 months of TANF cash assistance; or

10 *(E)* by any person assigned to a work participation activity for 11 substance use disorders.

12 (6) TANF work experience placements shall be reviewed after 90 13 days and are limited to six months per 48-month lifetime limit. A client's 14 progress shall be reviewed prior to each new placement regardless of the 15 length of time they are at the work experience site.

16 (7) TANF participants with disabilities shall engage in required employment activities to the maximum extent consistent with their 17 abilities. TANF participants shall provide current documentation by a 18 19 qualified medical practitioner that details the abilities to engage in employment and any limitations in work activities along with the expected 20 duration of such limitations. Disability is defined as a physical or mental 21 22 impairment constituting or resulting in a substantial impediment to 23 employment for such individual.

24 (8) Non-cooperation is the failure of the applicant or recipient to 25 comply with all requirements provided in state and federal law, federal 26 and state rules and regulations and agency policy. The period of 27 ineligibility for TANF benefits based on non-cooperation with work 28 programs shall be as follows:

(A) For a first penalty, three months and full cooperation with work
 program activities;

(B) for a second penalty, six months and full cooperation with work
 program activities;

(C) for a third penalty, one year and full cooperation with work
 program activities; and

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(D) for a fourth or subsequent penalty, 10 years.

(9) Individuals that have not cooperated with TANF work programs
shall be ineligible to participate in the food assistance program. The
comparable penalty shall be applied to only the individual in the food
assistance program who failed to comply with the TANF work
requirement. The agency shall impose the same penalty to the member of
the household who failed to comply with TANF requirements. The penalty
periods are three months, six months, one year, or 10 years.

43 (10) Non-cooperation is the failure of the applicant or recipient to

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comply with all requirements provided in state and federal law, federal
 and state rules and regulations and agency policy. The period of
 ineligibility for child care subsidy or TANF benefits based on parents' non cooperation with child support services shall be as follows:

5 (*A*) For the first penalty, three months and cooperation with child 6 support services prior to regaining eligibility;

7 (B) for a second penalty, six months and cooperation with child 8 support services prior to regaining eligibility;

9 (*C*) for a third penalty, one year and cooperation with child support 10 services prior to regaining eligibility; and

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(D) for a fourth penalty, 10 years.

12 *(11)* Individuals that have not cooperated without good cause with 13 child support services shall be ineligible to participate in the food 14 assistance program. The period of disqualification ends once it has been 15 determined that such individual is cooperating with child support services.

16 (12) Any individual who is found to have committed fraud or is found 17 guilty of the crime of theft pursuant to K.S.A. 39-720 and K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 21-5801, and amendments thereto, in either the TANF or child care 18 19 program shall render all adults in the family unit ineligible for TANF 20 assistance. Adults in the household who were determined to have 21 committed fraud or were convicted of the crime of theft pursuant to K.S.A. 22 39-720 and K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 21-5801, and amendments thereto, shall 23 render themselves and all adult household members ineligible for their lifetime for TANF, even if fraud was committed in only one program. 24 25 Households who have been determined to have committed fraud or were 26 convicted of the crime of theft pursuant to K.S.A. 39-720 and K.S.A. 2014 27 Supp. 21-5801, and amendments thereto, shall be required to name a 28 protective pavee as approved by the secretary or the secretary's designee 29 to administer TANF benefits on behalf of the children. No adult in a 30 household may have access to the TANF cash assistance benefit.

31 (13) Food assistance shall not be provided to any person convicted of a felony offense occurring on or after July 1, 2015, which includes as an 32 33 element of such offense the manufacture, cultivation, distribution, 34 possession or use of a controlled substance or controlled substance analog. For food assistance, the individual shall be permanently 35 36 disqualified if they have been convicted of a state or federal felony offense 37 occurring on or after July 1, 2015, involving possession or use of a 38 controlled substance or controlled substance analog. Notwithstanding the provisions of this paragraph, an individual shall be eligible for 39 food assistance if the individual enrolls in and participates in a drug 40 treatment program approved by the secretary, submits to and passes a 41 drug test and agrees to submit to drug testing if requested by the 42 43 department pursuant to a drug testing plan.

1 An individual's failure to submit to testing or failure to successfully 2 pass a drug test shall result in ineligibility for food assistance until a drug test is successfully passed. Failure to successfully complete a 3 drug treatment program shall result in ineligibility for food assistance 4 until a drug treatment plan approved by the secretary is successfully 5 6 completed, the individual passes a drug test and agrees to submit to 7 drug testing if requested by the department pursuant to a drug testing 8 plan.

9 (14) No TANF cash assistance shall be used to purchase-items, such as alcohol, cigarettes, tobacco products, lottery tickets, concert tickets, 10 professional or collegiate sporting event tickets or tickets for other 11 12 entertainment events intended for the general public or sexually oriented adult materials. No TANF cash assistance shall be used in any 13 retail liquor store, casino, gaming establishment, jewelry store, tattoo 14 parlor, massage parlor, body piercing parlor, spa, nail salon, lingerie 15 16 shop, tobacco paraphernalia store, vapor cigarette store, psychic or fortune telling business, bail bond company, video arcade, movie 17 18 theater, swimming pool, cruise ship, theme park, dog or horse racing 19 facility, parimutuel facility, or sexually oriented business or any retail establishment which provides adult-oriented entertainment in which 20 21 performers disrobe or perform in an unclothed state for entertainment, or 22 in any business or retail establishment where minors under age 18 are not permitted. TANF cash assistance transactions for cash withdrawals 23 from automated teller machines shall be limited to \$60 per transaction 24 25 and to one transaction per day. No TANF cash assistance shall be used for purchases at points of sale outside the state of Kansas. 26

(15) (A) The secretary for children and families shall place a 27 28 photograph of the recipient of public assistance on any Kansas 29 benefits card issued by the Kansas department for children and families that the recipient uses in obtaining food, cash or any other 30 services. When a recipient of public assistance is a minor or otherwise 31 32 incapacitated individual, a parent or legal guardian of such recipient 33 may have a photograph of such parent or legal guardian placed on the 34 card.

(B) Any Kansas benefits card with a photograph of a recipient
shall be valid for voting purposes as a public assistance identification
card in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 25-2908, and
amendments thereto.

(C) As used in this paragraph and its subparagraphs, "Kansas
benefits card" means any card issued to provide food assistance, cash
assistance or child care assistance, including, but not limited to, the
vision card, EBT card and Kansas benefits card.

43 (15)(16) The secretary for children and families shall adopt rules and

1 *regulations*:

2 (A) In determining eligibility for the child care subsidy program,
3 including an income of a cohabiting partner in a child care household;
4 and

5 (B) in determining and maintaining eligibility for non-TANF child 6 care, requiring that all included adults shall be employed a minimum of 20 7 hours per week or more as defined by the secretary or meet the following 8 specific qualifying exemptions:

9 *(i) Adults who are not capable of meeting the requirement due to a* 10 *documented physical or mental condition;*

(ii) adults who are former TANF recipients who need child care for
employment after their TANF case has closed and earned income is a
factor in the closure in the two months immediately following TANF
closure;

(iii) adult parents included in a case in which the only child receiving
benefits is the child of a minor parent who is working on completion of
high school or obtaining a GED; or

(iv) adults who are participants in a mandatory food assistance
 education and training program.

The department for children and families shall provide child care for 20 the pursuit of any degree or certification if the occupation has at least an 21 22 average job outlook listed in the occupational outlook of the U.S. 23 department of labor, bureau of labor statistics. For occupations with less than an average job outlook, educational plans shall require approval of 24 the secretary or secretary's designee. Child care may also be approved if 25 the student provides verification of a specific job offer that will be 26 available to such student upon completion of the program. Child care for 27 post-secondary education shall be allowed for a lifetime maximum of 24 28 29 months per adult. The 24 months may not have to be consecutive. Students shall be engaged in paid employment for a minimum of 15 hours per week. 30 In a two-parent adult household, child care would not be allowed if both 31 32 parents are adults and attending a formal education or training program 33 at the same time. The household may choose which one of the parents is participating as a post-secondary student. The other parent shall meet 34 35 another approvable criteria for child care subsidy.

(16)(17) The secretary for children and families is prohibited from 36 37 requesting or implementing a waiver or program from the U.S. department 38 of agriculture for the time limited assistance provisions for able-bodied 39 adults aged 18 through 49 without dependents in a household under the food assistance program. The time on food assistance for able-bodied 40 adults aged 18 through 49 without dependents in the household shall be 41 limited to three months in a 36-month period if such adults are not 42 43 meeting the requirements imposed by the U.S. department of agriculture

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1 that they must work for at least 20 hours per week or participate in a 2 federally approved work program or its equivalent.

(17)(18) Eligibility for the food assistance program shall be limited 3 to those individuals who are citizens or who meet qualified non-citizen 4 status as determined by U.S. department of agriculture. Non-citizen 5 6 individuals who are unable or unwilling to provide qualifying immigrant 7 documentation, as defined by the U.S. department of agriculture, residing within a household shall not be included when determining the 8 household's size for the purposes of assigning a benefit level to the 9 household for food assistance or comparing the household's monthly 10 income with the income eligibility standards. The gross non-exempt 11 12 earned and unearned income and resources of disqualified individuals shall be counted in its entirety as available to the remaining household 13 14 memhers

15 (b) Assistance to families with dependent children. Assistance may be 16 granted under this act to any dependent child, or relative, subject to the 17 general eligibility requirements as set out in subsection (a), who resides in the state of Kansas or whose parent or other relative with whom the child 18 19 is living resides in the state of Kansas. Such assistance shall be known as aid to families with dependent children. Where husband and wife are-20 living together both shall register for work under the program-21 requirements for aid to families with dependent children in accordance 22 23 with criteria and guidelines prescribed by rules and regulations of the-24 secretary.

25 (18)(19) The secretary for children and families shall not enact the 26 state option from the U.S. department of agriculture for broad-based 27 categorical eligibility for households applying for food assistance 28 according to the provisions of 7 C.F.R. § 273.2(j)(2)(ii).

(19)(20) No federal or state funds shall be used for television, radio
 or billboard advertisements that are designed to promote food assistance
 benefits and enrollment. No federal or state funding shall be used for any
 agreements with foreign governments designed to promote food
 assistance.

(21) (A) The secretary for children and families shall not apply
gross income standards for food assistance higher than the standards
specified in 7 U.S.C. § 2014(c) unless expressly required by federal
law. Categorical eligibility exempting households from such gross
income standards requirements shall not be granted for any non-cash,
in-kind or other benefit unless expressly required by federal law.

40 **(B)** The secretary for children and families shall not apply 41 resource limits standards for food assistance that are higher than the 42 standards specified in 7 U.S.C. § 2014(g)(1) unless expressly required 43 by federal law. Categorical eligibility exempting households from such

resource limits shall not be granted for any non-cash, in-kind or other benefit unless expressly required by federal law.

3 (c) *Aid to families with dependent children* Temporary assistance for 4 needy families; assignment of support rights and limited power of attorney. By applying for or receiving aid to families with dependent 5 6 children temporary assistance for needy families such applicant or 7 recipient shall be deemed to have assigned to the secretary on behalf of the 8 state any accrued, present or future rights to support from any other person 9 such applicant may have in such person's own behalf or in behalf of any other family member for whom the applicant is applying for or receiving 10 aid. In any case in which an order for child support has been established 11 12 and the legal custodian and obligee under the order surrenders physical custody of the child to a caretaker relative without obtaining a 13 14 modification of legal custody and support rights on behalf of the child are 15 assigned pursuant to this section, the surrender of physical custody and the 16 assignment shall transfer, by operation of law, the child's support rights 17 under the order to the secretary on behalf of the state. Such assignment 18 shall be of all accrued, present or future rights to support of the child 19 surrendered to the caretaker relative. The assignment of support rights 20 shall automatically become effective upon the date of approval for or 21 receipt of such aid without the requirement that any document be signed 22 by the applicant, recipient or obligee. By applying for or receiving aid to 23 families with dependent children temporary assistance for needy families, or by surrendering physical custody of a child to a caretaker relative who 24 25 is an applicant or recipient of such assistance on the child's behalf, the applicant, recipient or obligee is also deemed to have appointed the 26 27 secretary, or the secretary's designee, as an attorney in fact to perform the 28 specific act of negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, money orders 29 or other negotiable instruments representing support payments received by the secretary in behalf of any person applying for, receiving or having 30 31 received such assistance. This limited power of attorney shall be effective 32 from the date the secretary approves the application for aid and shall 33 remain in effect until the assignment of support rights has been terminated 34 in full.

(d) *Eligibility requirements for general assistance, the cost of which is not shared by the federal government.* (1) General assistance may be
granted to eligible persons who do not qualify for financial assistance in a
program in which the federal government participates and who satisfy the
additional requirements prescribed by or under this subsection (d).

40 (A) To qualify for general assistance in any form a needy person must
 41 have insufficient income or resources to provide a reasonable subsistence
 42 compatible with decency and health and, except as provided for 43 transitional assistance, be a member of a family in which a minor child or

1 a pregnant woman resides or be unable to engage in employment. The 2 secretary shall adopt rules and regulations prescribing criteria for-3 establishing when a minor child may be considered to be living with a 4 family and whether a person is able to engage in employment, including 5 such factors as age or physical or mental condition. Eligibility for general 6 assistance, other than transitional assistance, is limited to families in which 7 a minor child or a pregnant woman resides or to an adult or family in-8 which all legally responsible family members are unable to engage in-9 employment. Where a husband and wife are living together the combined 10 income or resources of both shall be considered in determining the-11 eligibility of either or both for such assistance unless otherwise prohibited 12 by law. The secretary in determining need of any applicant for or recipient 13 of general assistance shall not take into account the financial responsibility of any individual for any applicant or recipient of general assistance unless 14 15 such applicant or recipient is such individual's spouse or such individual's 16 minor child or a minor stepchild if the stepchild is living with such 17 individual. In determining the need of an individual, the secretary may-18 provide for income and resource exemptions.

(B) To qualify for general assistance in any form a needy person must
 be a citizen of the United States or an alien lawfully admitted to the United
 States and must be residing in the state of Kansas.

(2) General assistance in the form of transitional assistance may be granted to eligible persons who do not qualify for financial assistance in a program in which the federal government participates and who satisfy the additional requirements prescribed by or under this subsection (d), but who do not meet the eriteria prescribed by rules and regulations of the secretary relating to inability to engage in employment or are not a member of a family in which a minor or a pregnant woman resides.

29 (3) In addition to the other requirements prescribed under this 30 subsection (d), the secretary shall adopt rules and regulations which 31 establish community work experience program requirements for eligibility 32 for the receipt of general assistance in any form and which establish-33 penalties to be imposed when a work assignment under a community work 34 experience program requirement is not completed without good cause. The 35 secretary may adopt rules and regulations establishing exemptions from 36 any such community work experience program requirements. A first time 37 failure to complete such a work assignment requirement shall result in-38 ineligibility to receive general assistance for a period fixed by such rules 39 and regulations of not more than three calendar months. A subsequent-40 failure to complete such a work assignment requirement shall result in a period fixed by such rules and regulations of ineligibility of not more than 41 42 six calendar months.

43 (4) If any person is found guilty of the crime of theft under the-

1 provisions of K.S.A. 39-720, and amendments thereto, such person shall

2 thereby become forever ineligible to receive any form of generalassistance under the provisions of this subsection (d) unless the conviction 3 4 is the person's first conviction under the provisions of K.S.A. 39-720, and 5 amendments thereto, or the law of any other state concerning welfare-6 fraud. First time offenders convicted of a misdemeanor under the 7 provisions of such statute shall become ineligible to receive any form of 8 general assistance for a period of 12 calendar months from the date of 9 conviction. First time offenders convicted of a felony under the provisions 10 of such statute shall become ineligible to receive any form of generalassistance for a period of 60 calendar months from the date of conviction. 11 12 If any person is found guilty by a court of competent jurisdiction of any state other than the state of Kansas of a crime involving welfare fraud. 13 14 such person shall thereby become forever ineligible to receive any form of 15 general assistance under the provisions of this subsection (d) unless the 16 conviction is the person's first conviction under the law of any other state 17 concerning welfare fraud. First time offenders convicted of a misdemeanor under the law of any other state concerning welfare fraud shall become-18 19 ineligible to receive any form of general assistance for a period of 12-20 calendar months from the date of conviction. First time offenders-21 convicted of a felony under the law of any other state concerning welfare 22 fraud shall become ineligible to receive any form of general assistance for 23 a period of 60 calendar months from the date of conviction.

24 (e) Requirements for medical assistance for which federal moneys or 25 state moneys or both are expended. (1) When the secretary has adopted a 26 medical care plan under which federal moneys or state moneys or both are 27 expended, medical assistance in accordance with such plan shall be 28 granted to any person who is a citizen of the United States or who is an 29 alien lawfully admitted to the United States and who is residing in the state of Kansas, whose resources and income do not exceed the levels 30 31 prescribed by the secretary. In determining the need of an individual, the 32 secretary may provide for income and resource exemptions and protected 33 income and resource levels. Resources from inheritance shall be counted. 34 A disclaimer of an inheritance pursuant to K.S.A. 59-2291, and 35 amendments thereto, shall constitute a transfer of resources. The secretary 36 shall exempt principal and interest held in irrevocable trust pursuant to 37 subsection (c) of K.S.A. 16-303(c), and amendments thereto, from the 38 eligibility requirements of applicants for and recipients of medical 39 assistance. Such assistance shall be known as medical assistance.

40 (2) For the purposes of medical assistance eligibility determinations
41 on or after July 1, 2004, if an applicant or recipient owns property in joint
42 tenancy with some other party and the applicant or recipient of medical
43 assistance has restricted or conditioned their interest in such property to a

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specific and discrete property interest less than 100%, then such 1 designation will cause the full value of the property to be considered an 2 3 available resource to the applicant or recipient. Medical assistance 4 eligibility for receipt of benefits under the title XIX of the social security 5 act, commonly known as medicaid, shall not be expanded, as provided for 6 in the patient protection and affordable care act, public law 111-148, 124 7 stat. 119, and the health care and education reconciliation act of 2010, 8 public law 111-152, 124 stat. 1029, unless the legislature expressly 9 consents to, and approves of, the expansion of medicaid services by an act 10 of the legislature.

(3) (A) Resources from trusts shall be considered when determining
eligibility of a trust beneficiary for medical assistance. Medical assistance
is to be secondary to all resources, including trusts, that may be available
to an applicant or recipient of medical assistance.

15 (B) If a trust has discretionary language, the trust shall be considered 16 to be an available resource to the extent, using the full extent of discretion, 17 the trustee may make any of the income or principal available to the applicant or recipient of medical assistance. Any such discretionary trust 18 19 shall be considered an available resource unless: (i) At the time of creation 20 or amendment of the trust, the trust states a clear intent that the trust is 21 supplemental to public assistance; and (ii) the trust: (a) Is funded from 22 resources of a person who, at the time of such funding, owed no duty of 23 support to the applicant or recipient of medical assistance: or (b) is funded 24 not more than nominally from resources of a person while that person 25 owed a duty of support to the applicant or recipient of medical assistance.

(C) For the purposes of this paragraph, "public assistance" includes,
but is not limited to, medicaid, medical assistance or title XIX of the social
security act.

29 (4) (A) When an applicant or recipient of medical assistance is a party 30 to a contract, agreement or accord for personal services being provided by 31 a nonlicensed individual or provider and such contract, agreement or 32 accord involves health and welfare monitoring, pharmacy assistance, case 33 management, communication with medical, health or other professionals, 34 or other activities related to home health care, long term care, medical 35 assistance benefits, or other related issues, any moneys paid under such 36 contract, agreement or accord shall be considered to be an available 37 resource unless the following restrictions are met: (i) The contract, 38 agreement or accord must be in writing and executed prior to any services 39 being provided; (ii) the moneys paid are in direct relationship with the fair 40 market value of such services being provided by similarly situated and 41 trained nonlicensed individuals; (iii) if no similarly situated nonlicensed 42 individuals or situations can be found, the value of services will be based 43 on federal hourly minimum wage standards; (iv) such individual providing the services will report all receipts of moneys as income to the appropriate state and federal governmental revenue agencies; (v) any amounts due under such contract, agreement or accord shall be paid after the services are rendered; (vi) the applicant or recipient shall have the power to revoke the contract, agreement or accord; and (vii) upon the death of the applicant or recipient, the contract, agreement or accord ceases.

7 (B) When an applicant or recipient of medical assistance is a party to 8 a written contract for personal services being provided by a licensed health 9 professional or facility and such contract involves health and welfare 10 monitoring, pharmacy assistance, case management, communication with medical, health or other professionals, or other activities related to home 11 12 health care, long term care, medical assistance benefits or other related issues, any moneys paid in advance of receipt of services for such 13 14 contracts shall be considered to be an available resource.

(5) Any trust may be amended if such amendment is permitted by theKansas uniform trust code.

17 (f)(e) Eligibility for medical assistance of resident receiving medical 18 care outside state. A person who is receiving medical care including long-19 term care outside of Kansas whose health would be endangered by the 20 postponement of medical care until return to the state or by travel to return 21 to Kansas, may be determined eligible for medical assistance if such 22 individual is a resident of Kansas and all other eligibility factors are met. 23 Persons who are receiving medical care on an ongoing basis in a long-term 24 medical care facility in a state other than Kansas and who do not return to 25 a care facility in Kansas when they are able to do so, shall no longer be 26 eligible to receive assistance in Kansas unless such medical care is not 27 available in a comparable facility or program providing such medical care 28 in Kansas. For persons who are minors or who are under guardianship, the 29 actions of the parent or guardian shall be deemed to be the actions of the 30 child or ward in determining whether or not the person is remaining 31 outside the state voluntarily.

32 (g)(f) Medical assistance; assignment of rights to medical support 33 and limited power of attorney; recovery from estates of deceased 34 recipients. (1) (A) Except as otherwise provided in K.S.A. 39-786 and 39-35 787, and amendments thereto, or as otherwise authorized on and after 36 September 30, 1989, under section 303 of the federal medicare 37 catastrophic coverage act of 1988, whichever is applicable, by applying for 38 or receiving medical assistance under a medical care plan in which federal 39 funds are expended, any accrued, present or future rights to support and 40 any rights to payment for medical care from a third party of an applicant or 41 recipient and any other family member for whom the applicant is applying 42 shall be deemed to have been assigned to the secretary on behalf of the 43 state. The assignment shall automatically become effective upon the date

of approval for such assistance without the requirement that any document 1 2 be signed by the applicant or recipient. By applying for or receiving 3 medical assistance the applicant or recipient is also deemed to have 4 appointed the secretary, or the secretary's designee, as an attorney in fact to 5 perform the specific act of negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, 6 money orders or other negotiable instruments, representing payments 7 received by the secretary in [on] behalf of any person applying for, 8 receiving or having received such assistance. This limited power of 9 attorney shall be effective from the date the secretary approves the 10 application for assistance and shall remain in effect until the assignment has been terminated in full. The assignment of any rights to payment for 11 12 medical care from a third party under this subsection shall not prohibit a 13 health care provider from directly billing an insurance carrier for services 14 rendered if the provider has not submitted a claim covering such services 15 to the secretary for payment. Support amounts collected on behalf of 16 persons whose rights to support are assigned to the secretary only under 17 this subsection and no other shall be distributed pursuant to subsection (d) 18 of K.S.A. 39-756(d), and amendments thereto, except that any amounts designated as medical support shall be retained by the secretary for 19 20 repayment of the unreimbursed portion of assistance. Amounts collected 21 pursuant to the assignment of rights to payment for medical care from a 22 third party shall also be retained by the secretary for repayment of the 23 unreimbursed portion of assistance.

(B) Notwithstanding the provisions of subparagraph (A), the
secretary of health and environment, or the secretary's designee, is hereby
authorized to and shall exercise any of the powers specified in
subparagraph (A) In relation to performance of such secretary's duties
pertaining to medical subrogation, estate recovery or any other duties
assigned to such secretary in article 74 of chapter 75 of the Kansas Statutes
Annotated, and amendments thereto.

31 (2) The amount of any medical assistance paid after June 30, 1992, 32 under the provisions of subsection (e) (d) is: (A) A claim against the 33 property or any interest therein belonging to and a part of the estate of any 34 deceased recipient or, if there is no estate, the estate of the surviving 35 spouse, if any, shall be charged for such medical assistance paid to either 36 or both;; and (B) a claim against any funds of such recipient or spouse in 37 any account under K.S.A. 9-1215, 9-1216, 17-2263, 17-2264, 17-5828 or 38 17-5829, and amendments thereto. There shall be no recovery of medical 39 assistance correctly paid to or on behalf of an individual under subsection 40 (e) (d) except after the death of the surviving spouse of the individual, if 41 any, and only at a time when the individual has no surviving child who is 42 under 21 years of age or is blind or permanently and totally disabled. 43 Transfers of real or personal property by recipients of medical assistance

without adequate consideration are voidable and may be set aside. Except 1 2 where there is a surviving spouse, or a surviving child who is under 21 3 years of age or is blind or permanently and totally disabled, the amount of 4 any medical assistance paid under subsection (e) (d) is a claim against the 5 estate in any guardianship or conservatorship proceeding. The monetary 6 value of any benefits received by the recipient of such medical assistance 7 under long-term care insurance, as defined by K.S.A. 40-2227, and 8 amendments thereto, shall be a credit against the amount of the claim 9 provided for such medical assistance under this subsection (g). The 10 secretary of health and environment is authorized to enforce each claim provided for under this subsection (g). The secretary of health and 11 12 environment shall not be required to pursue every claim, but is granted discretion to determine which claims to pursue. All moneys received by 13 the secretary of health and environment from claims under this subsection 14 (g) shall be deposited in the social welfare fund. The secretary of health 15 16 and environment may adopt rules and regulations for the implementation 17 and administration of the medical assistance recovery program under this 18 subsection (g).

(3) By applying for or receiving medical assistance under the provisions of article 7 of chapter 39 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, and amendments thereto, such individual or such individual's agent, fiduciary, guardian, conservator, representative payee or other person acting on behalf of the individual consents to the following definitions of estate and the results therefrom:

(A) If an individual receives any medical assistance before July 1,
2004, pursuant to article 7 of chapter 39 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated,
and amendments thereto, which forms the basis for a claim under
subsection (g) paragraph (2), such claim is limited to the individual's
probatable estate as defined by applicable law; and

30 (B) if an individual receives any medical assistance on or after July 1, 31 2004, pursuant to article 7 of chapter 39 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, 32 and amendments thereto, which forms the basis for a claim under 33 subsection (g) paragraph (2), such claim shall apply to the individual's 34 medical assistance estate. The medical assistance estate is defined as 35 including all real and personal property and other assets in which the deceased individual had any legal title or interest immediately before or at 36 37 the time of death to the extent of that interest or title. The medical 38 assistance estate includes, without limitation assets conveyed to a survivor, 39 heir or assign of the deceased recipient through joint tenancy, tenancy in 40 common, survivorship, transfer-on-death deed, payable-on-death contract, 41 life estate, trust, annuities or similar arrangement.

42 (4) The secretary of health and environment or the secretary's 43 designee is authorized to file and enforce a lien against the real property of 1 a recipient of medical assistance in certain situations, subject to all prior

liens of record and transfers for value to a bona fide purchaser of record.
The lien must be filed in the office of the register of deeds of the county
where the real property is located within one year from the date of death of
the recipient and must contain the legal description of all real property in
the county subject to the lien.

7 (A) After the death of a recipient of medical assistance, the secretary 8 of health and environment or the secretary's designee may place a lien on 9 any interest in real property owned by such recipient.

(B) The secretary of health and environment or the secretary's 10 designee may place a lien on any interest in real property owned by a 11 12 recipient of medical assistance during the lifetime of such recipient. Such 13 lien may be filed only after notice and an opportunity for a hearing has 14 been given. Such lien may be enforced only upon competent medical 15 testimony that the recipient cannot reasonably be expected to be 16 discharged and returned home. A six-month period of compensated 17 inpatient care at a nursing home or other medical institution shall 18 constitute a determination by the department of health and environment 19 that the recipient cannot reasonably be expected to be discharged and 20 returned home. To return home means the recipient leaves the nursing or 21 medical facility and resides in the home on which the lien has been placed 22 for a continuous period of at least 90 days without being readmitted as an 23 inpatient to a nursing or medical facility. The amount of the lien shall be 24 for the amount of assistance paid by the department of health and 25 environment until the time of the filing of the lien and for any amount paid 26 thereafter for such medical assistance to the recipient. After the lien is filed 27 against any real property owned by the recipient, such lien will be 28 dissolved if the recipient is discharged, returns home and resides upon the 29 real property to which the lien is attached for a continuous period of at 30 least 90 days without being readmitted as an inpatient to a nursing or 31 medical facility. If the recipient is readmitted as an inpatient to a nursing or 32 medical facility for a continuous period of less than 90 days, another 33 continuous period of at least 90 days shall be completed prior to 34 dissolution of the lien.

(5) The lien filed by the secretary of health and environment or the secretary's designee for medical assistance correctly received may be enforced before or after the death of the recipient by the filing of an action to foreclose such lien in the Kansas district court or through an estate probate court action in the county where the real property of the recipient is located. However, it may be enforced only:

(A) After the death of the surviving spouse of the recipient;

42 (B) when there is no child of the recipient, natural or adopted, who is43 20 years of age or less residing in the home;

1 (C) when there is no adult child of the recipient, natural or adopted, 2 who is blind or disabled residing in the home; or

3 (D) when no brother or sister of the recipient is lawfully residing in 4 the home, who has resided there for at least one year immediately before 5 the date of the recipient's admission to the nursing or medical facility, and 6 has resided there on a continuous basis since that time.

7 (6) The lien remains on the property even after a transfer of the title 8 by conveyance, sale, succession, inheritance or will unless one of the 9 following events occur:

10 (A) The lien is satisfied. The recipient, the heirs, personal representative or assigns of the recipient may discharge such lien at any 11 time by paying the amount of the lien to the secretary of health and 12 environment or the secretary's designee; 13

(B) the lien is terminated by foreclosure of prior lien of record or 14 15 settlement action taken in lieu of foreclosure; or

16 (C) the value of the real property is consumed by the lien, at which 17 time the secretary of health and environment or the secretary's designee 18 may force the sale for the real property to satisfy the lien.

19 (7) If the secretary for aging and disability services or the secretary of 20 health and environment, or both, or such secretary's designee has not filed 21 an action to foreclose the lien in the Kansas district court in the county 22 where the real property is located within 10 years from the date of the 23 filing of the lien, then the lien shall become dormant, and shall cease to 24 operate as a lien on the real estate of the recipient. Such dormant lien may 25 be revived in the same manner as a dormant judgment lien is revived under K.S.A. 60-2403 et seq., and amendments thereto. 26

27 (8) Within seven days of receipt of notice by the secretary for 28 children and families or the secretary's designee of the death of a recipient 29 of medical assistance under this subsection, the secretary for children and families or the secretary's designee shall give notice of such recipient's 30 31 death to the secretary of health and environment or the secretary's 32 designee.

33 (9) All rules and regulations adopted on and after July 1, 2013, and 34 prior to July 1, 2014, to implement this subsection shall continue to be 35 effective and shall be deemed to be duly adopted rules and regulations of 36 the secretary of health and environment until revised, amended, revoked or 37 nullified pursuant to law.

38 (h)(g) Placement under the revised Kansas code for care of children 39 or revised Kansas juvenile justice code; assignment of support rights and limited power of attorney. In any case in which the secretary for children 40 41 and families pays for the expenses of care and custody of a child pursuant to K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 38-2201 et seq. or 38-2301 et seq., and amendments 42 43 thereto, including the expenses of any foster care placement, an

assignment of all past, present and future support rights of the child in 1 2 custody possessed by either parent or other person entitled to receive support payments for the child is, by operation of law, conveyed to the 3 4 secretary. Such assignment shall become effective upon placement of a child in the custody of the secretary or upon payment of the expenses of 5 6 care and custody of a child by the secretary without the requirement that 7 any document be signed by the parent or other person entitled to receive 8 support payments for the child. When the secretary pays for the expenses of care and custody of a child or a child is placed in the custody of the 9 10 secretary, the parent or other person entitled to receive support payments for the child is also deemed to have appointed the secretary, or the 11 12 secretary's designee, as attorney in fact to perform the specific act of negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, money orders or other 13 14 negotiable instruments representing support payments received by the 15 secretary on behalf of the child. This limited power of attorney shall be 16 effective from the date the assignment to support rights becomes effective 17 and shall remain in effect until the assignment of support rights has been 18 terminated in full.

19 (i)(h) No person who voluntarily quits employment or who is fired 20 from employment due to gross misconduct as defined by rules and 21 regulations of the secretary or who is a fugitive from justice by reason of a 22 felony conviction or charge or violation of a condition of probation or 23 parole imposed under federal or state law shall be eligible to receive 24 public assistance benefits in this state. Any recipient of public assistance 25 who fails to timely comply with monthly reporting requirements under criteria and guidelines prescribed by rules and regulations of the secretary 26 27 shall be subject to a penalty established by the secretary by rules and 28 regulations.

29 (i) (i) If the applicant or recipient of aid to families with dependent children temporary assistance for needy families is a mother of the 30 dependent child, as a condition of the mother's eligibility for-aid to-31 32 families with dependent children temporary assistance for needy families 33 the mother shall identify by name and, if known, by current address the 34 father of the dependent child except that the secretary may adopt by rules 35 and regulations exceptions to this requirement in cases of undue hardship. 36 Any recipient of aid to families with dependent children temporary 37 assistance for needy families who fails to cooperate with requirements 38 relating to child support-enforcement services under criteria and guidelines 39 prescribed by rules and regulations of the secretary shall be subject to a penalty established by the secretary by rules and regulations which penalty 40 41 shall progress to ineligibility for the family after three months of-42 noncooperation.

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3 (k)(j) By applying for or receiving child care benefits or food stamps

1 assistance, the applicant or recipient shall be deemed to have assigned. 2 pursuant to K.S.A. 39-756, and amendments thereto, to the secretary on 3 behalf of the state only accrued, present or future rights to support from 4 any other person such applicant may have in such person's own behalf or 5 in behalf of any other family member for whom the applicant is applying 6 for or receiving aid. The assignment of support rights shall automatically 7 become effective upon the date of approval for or receipt of such aid 8 without the requirement that any document be signed by the applicant or 9 recipient. By applying for or receiving child care benefits or food-stamps 10 assistance, the applicant or recipient is also deemed to have appointed the 11 secretary, or the secretary's designee, as an attorney in fact to perform the 12 specific act of negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, money orders 13 or other negotiable instruments representing support payments received by 14 the secretary in behalf of any person applying for, receiving or having 15 received such assistance. This limited power of attorney shall be effective 16 from the date the secretary approves the application for aid and shall 17 remain in effect until the assignment of support rights has been terminated 18 in full. An applicant or recipient who has assigned support rights to the 19 secretary pursuant to this subsection shall cooperate in establishing and 20 enforcing support obligations to the same extent required of applicants for 21 or recipients of aid to families with dependent children temporary 22 assistance for needy families.

23 (H)(k) (1) A program of drug screening for applicants for cash 24 assistance as a condition of eligibility for cash assistance and persons 25 receiving cash assistance as a condition of continued receipt of cash 26 assistance shall be established, subject to applicable federal law, by the 27 secretary for children and families on and before January 1, 2014. Under 28 such program of drug screening, the secretary for children and families 29 shall order a drug screening of an applicant for or a recipient of cash 30 assistance at any time when reasonable suspicion exists that such applicant 31 for or recipient of cash assistance is unlawfully using a controlled 32 substance or controlled substance analog. 42 (2) Any applicant for or recipient of cash assistance whose drug 43 screening results in a positive test may request that the drug screening specimen be sent to a different drug testing facility for an additional drug screening. Any applicant for or recipient of cash assistance who requests an additional drug screening at a different drug testing facility shall be required to pay the cost of drug screening. Such applicant or recipient who took the additional drug screening and who tested negative for unlawful use of a controlled substance and controlled substance analog shall be reimbursed for the cost of such additional drug screening.

8 (3) Any applicant for or recipient of cash assistance who tests 9 positive for unlawful use of a controlled substance or controlled substance 10 analog shall be required to complete a substance abuse treatment program approved by the secretary for children and families, secretary of labor or 11 12 secretary of commerce, and a job skills program approved by the secretary 13 for children and families, secretary of labor or secretary of commerce. 14 Subject to applicable federal laws, any applicant for or recipient of cash assistance who fails to complete or refuses to participate in the substance 15 16 abuse treatment program or job skills program as required under this 17 subsection shall be ineligible to receive cash assistance until completion of 18 such substance abuse treatment and job skills programs. Upon completion 19 of both substance abuse treatment and job skills programs, such applicant 20 for or recipient of cash assistance may be subject to periodic drug 21 screening, as determined by the secretary for children and families. Upon a 22 second positive test for unlawful use of a controlled substance or 23 controlled substance analog, a recipient of cash assistance shall be ordered 24 to complete again a substance abuse treatment program and job skills 25 program, and shall be terminated from cash assistance for a period of 12 26 months, or until such recipient of cash assistance completes both substance 27 abuse treatment and job skills programs, whichever is later. Upon a third 28 positive test for unlawful use of a controlled substance or controlled 29 substance analog, a recipient of cash assistance shall be terminated from 30 cash assistance, subject to applicable federal law.

31 (4) If an applicant for or recipient of cash assistance is ineligible for 32 or terminated from cash assistance as a result of a positive test for 33 unlawful use of a controlled substance or controlled substance analog, and 34 such applicant for or recipient of cash assistance is the parent or legal 35 guardian of a minor child, an appropriate protective payee shall be designated to receive cash assistance on behalf of such child. Such parent 36 37 or legal guardian of the minor child may choose to designate an individual 38 to receive cash assistance for such parent's or legal guardian's minor child, 39 as approved by the secretary for children and families. Prior to the 40 designated individual receiving any cash assistance, the secretary for 41 children and families shall review whether reasonable suspicion exists that 42 such designated individual is unlawfully using a controlled substance or 43 controlled substance analog.

1 (A) In addition, any individual designated to receive cash assistance 2 on behalf of an eligible minor child shall be subject to drug screening at 3 any time when reasonable suspicion exists that such designated individual 4 is unlawfully using a controlled substance or controlled substance analog. 5 The secretary for children and families may use any information obtained 6 by the secretary for children and families to determine whether such 7 reasonable suspicion exists, including, but not limited to, the designated 8 individual's demeanor, missed appointments and arrest or other police 9 records, previous employment or application for employment in an 10 occupation or industry that regularly conducts drug screening, termination from previous employment due to unlawful use of a controlled substance 11 12 or controlled substance analog or prior drug screening records of the 13 designated individual indicating unlawful use of a controlled substance or 14 controlled substance analog.

Such designated individual who took the additional drug 21 screening and who tested negative for unlawful use of a controlled 22 substance and controlled substance analog shall be reimbursed for the cost 23 of such additional drug screening.

(C) Upon any positive test for unlawful use of a controlled substance or controlled substance analog, the designated individual shall not receive cash assistance on behalf of the parent's or legal guardian's minor child, and another designated individual shall be selected by the secretary for children and families to receive cash assistance on behalf of such parent's or legal guardian's minor child.

30 (5) If a person has been convicted under federal or state law of any 31 offense which is classified as a felony by the law of the jurisdiction and 32 which has as an element of such offense the manufacture, cultivation, 33 distribution, possession or use of a controlled substance or controlled 34 substance analog, and the date of conviction is on or after July 1, 2013, 35 such person shall thereby become forever ineligible to receive any cash 36 assistance under this subsection unless such conviction is the person's first 37 conviction. Fourth class, all other demands duly proved, including the cost of any appropriate tombstone or marker or the lettering thereon, in such amount as may be reasonably necessary, but whether there shall be an allowance, and if so the amount thereof, shall be determined by the court before any obligation therefor is incurred, except that debts having preference by the laws of the United States and demands having preference by the laws of this state shall be paid according to such preference.

Except as provided by this section for the first class of demands, no 1 2 preference shall be given in the payment of any demand over any other 3 demand of the same class, nor shall a demand due and payable be entitled 4 to preference over demands not due.

21 (b) Upon the filing of such a petition, the court shall issue an order 22 fixing the date, time and place of a hearing on the petition, which hearing 23 may be held forthwith and without further notice if those persons named 24 within the petition pursuant to the requirement of subsections (a)(3), (a)(4)25 and (a)(5), as applicable, have entered their appearances, waived notice, and agreed to the court's accepting the accounting and issuing an order of 26 27 final allowance and settlement.
