months ago this bill would have passed. Current

law used to be that only the legislature couldauthorize the sale of KBA, but you amended that

the same as it was previously. What has changed in this is that the 13,000,000 that was coming

20 from the general state aid adjustment, the 0.5

21 percent is gone, and that is replaced by the

22 13,000,000 from the Kansas Bioscience Authority

over 13,000,000, then the extraordinary needs fund

would not be adjusted.

20 this bill, signature of the Governor, and again

21 the plaintiffs and the state will do a joint

stipulation of Constitutional compliance to give a

surety to our state that schools remain open.

- extraordinary needs funds is now, if this bill
- 10 passes, to be administered by the Department of
- 11 Education. The districts would, if they don't --
- 12 if they can't -- the money doesn't come during
- 13 their -- if the money does not come before their
- 14 budgeting period, the districts will not be able
- 15 to use the money this fiscal year. And so what
- 16 this would do is basically allow the Department to
- 17 still authorize funds that are contingent upon the
- 18 sale, but our districts will then be allowed to
- 19 budget the funds and they wouldn't have to wait
- 20 until next year to use them. So if the -- if the
- 21 money doesn't come in, then, of course, they
- 22 wouldn't be there. But if the money does come in,
- 23 when the money does come in, if it's past their
- 24 budgeting period, they could not spend it without
- 25 reauthorizing and publishing their budgets, and

1 the schools to budget for the money. As all their

- 2 budgets, if the money does not come in, they don't
- spend it. But if the money comes in and it's not
- in their budget, although they have received the
- money, they cannot spend it this fiscal year.
- This allows them to spend it if they budget for 6 7
