To the Honorable Chairman and Representatives of the House Federal and State Affairs Committee:

To those who would consider supporting this resolution, I ask one very important question: If the Constitution were actually followed, what would you change?

You see, I have asked many supporters of this resolution that same question, and their answers are all fundamentally the same. They all essentially agree that our government would work just fine if it lived within the limits of our current Constitution.

We must hold every elected official accountable to every provision in the Constitution on every vote and every decision, whether these officials are on "our" side or "their" side.

In the words of Winston Churchill, we must "Never give in--never, never, never, never, in nothing great or small, large or petty, never give in except to convictions of honour and good sense. Never yield to force; never yield to the apparently overwhelming might of the enemy."

The Constitution is not broken. We must never cease defending it, as it is today. That is our only hope.
