**SUBJECT:** Fiscal Note for HB 2292 by House Committee on Corrections and Juvenile Justice

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2292 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

Under current law, farm wineries, farm winery outlets, microbrewers, and microdistilleries cannot employ a person in connection with the manufacture or sale of alcoholic liquor if that person has been convicted of a felony. HB 2292 would remove this restriction.

Current law prohibits the employment or continued employment of a person in connection with the sale, serving, or dispensing of cereal malt beverages if the licensee knows the person has been, within the preceding two years, adjudged guilty of a felony. The bill would remove this restriction.

According to the Department of Revenue, enactment of HB 2292 would have no fiscal effect.
