SUPPLEMENTAL NOTE ON SENATE BILL NO. 415

As Amended by Senate Committee on
Assessment and Taxation

Brief*

SB 415 would create a diversion of sales tax receipts from the State General Fund (SGF) such that a portion of state collections by the Kansas State Fair (Fair) and retailers on the fairgrounds would be deposited instead into to the State Fair Capital Improvements Fund (SFCIF), effective July 1, 2018. Current law allocates 83.846 percent of such collections to the SGF and 16.154 percent to the State Highway Fund (SHF). The SFCIF would begin receiving the SGF's relative portion of the aforementioned Fair-related collections.

The bill also would repeal an existing statutory transfer from the SGF to the SFCIF. Current law sets that transfer at not more than \$100,000 per year for FY 2018 and FY 2019 and not more than \$300,000 per year in subsequent years.

Background

The bill was introduced by the Senate Committee on Ways and Means. In the Senate Committee on Assessment and Taxation hearing on March 7, representatives of the Kansas Department of Agriculture and the Fair appeared as proponents, citing the inability of the Fair to maintain some of its facilities in the wake of enacted reductions to the SGF transfer amount in recent years. No other testimony was provided.

The original bill would have diverted all state sales tax collections (SGF and SHF portions) to the SFCIF. The Senate Committee on March 13 amended the bill to hold the SHF collections harmless relative to current law.

According to the fiscal note on the original bill prepared by the Division of the Budget, the Department of Revenue indicates enactment of the bill would be expected to divert \$350,000 per year in state sales tax collections beginning in FY 2019. Of this amount, \$293,461 would have represented a reduction in SGF receipts and \$56,539 would have represented a reduction in SHF receipts. Transfers from the SGF also would be reduced by \$100,000 for FY 2019, relative to the amount reflected in *The FY 2019 Governor's Budget Report*. The net impact on the SGF would be a reduction of \$193,461 in receipts. The SFCIF would have a net increase of an identical amount under the Senate Committee amendment. Any fiscal effect associated with enactment of the bill is not reflected in *The FY 2019 Governor's Budget Report*.
