**SUPPLEMENTAL NOTE ON SENATE BILL NO. 93**

As Recommended by Senate Committee on  
Judiciary

**Brief\***

SB 93 would clarify the law concerning revocation of a person's driving privileges. The bill would specify the Division of Vehicles would revoke driving privileges for a period of 90 days upon its receipt of a record that a person has been convicted of certain crimes. Current law requires revocation, but does not specify the duration.

**Background**

The bill was introduced at the request of the Kansas Division of Vehicles. In the Senate Committee on Judiciary, a representative of the Drivers Solutions Office (Office) appeared in support of the bill and explained the change would align the law with current practice. When the Office receives notice of a conviction for a crime, such as reckless driving, involuntary manslaughter, or vehicular homicide, the Office revokes the person's driving privileges for 90 days, which aligns with similar sanction duration defined in other statutes. The change would provide clarity for drivers. No other testimony was provided.

According to the fiscal note prepared by the Division of the Budget, the Department of Revenue indicates the bill would increase its expenditures by \$1,162.50, including \$962.50 to revise KanDrive design documentation and development application code and \$200 for testing. The

Office of Judicial Administration indicates any fiscal effect resulting from the bill would be negligible. Any fiscal effect is not reflected in *The FY 2018 Governor's Budget Report*.
