Subject: Proponent Testimony on S.B. 242 – Property tax abatement for agricultural improvement destroyed or substantially destroyed by a natural disaster

Date: February 11, 2020

Chairman Tyson and members of the Senate Assessment and Taxation Committee, thank you for the opportunity to present testimony in support of S.B. 242 on behalf of the Kansas Soybean Association (KSA). KSA represents Kansas soybean farmers on legislative and regulatory issues.

Kansas was 10th in state soybean production at 186 million bushels in 2019. The Kansas Department of Agriculture reports that oilseeds, mainly soybeans, in Kansas have a direct economic output of more than \$1.28 billion and provide more than 1,000 jobs. Adding induced impacts, the oilseed industry supports over 4,000 jobs and creates a total economic contribution of \$1.8 billion.

S.B. 242 allows a taxpayer who has made an “agricultural improvement” in the way of a farm building or structure that is destroyed or substantially destroyed by a natural disaster to request up to a three year abatement of property taxes from the local county commission.

The provision is similar to current law relating to homesteads destroyed or substantially destroyed by a natural disaster.

S.B. 242 makes good sense and represents good public policy. It would provide some reasonable financial relief for those impacted by a natural disaster should the governor declare the event a disaster and the county commissioners grant the abatement.

KSA respectfully requests the Senate Assessment and Taxation Committee report S.B. 242 favorably for passage.
