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#### Testimony to the Senate Committee on Judiciary in Support of SB 119

Feb.20, 2019

Chairman Wilborn, Vice Chairman Rucker, Ranking Member Miller, and members of the committee,

The Johnson County Sheriff's Office supports SB 119 - Encouraging judicial districts to establish and utilize specialty courts. We have the only Veterans Treatment Court (VTC) in the state of Kansas. It was implemented in 2016. One of my assigned duties is to be the liaison between the VTC and the Sheriff's Office. I serve on the Veterans Treatment Court Steering Committee in that capacity.

The mission of the Veterans Treatment Court (VTC) is to identify veterans in the criminal justice system and, when eligible, get them into treatment and court supervision as an alternative to incarceration. The primary objective of the Veterans Treatment Court is to promote public safety by providing an interagency, collaborative, non-adversarial treatment strategy to veterans in the criminal justice system who suffer from mental health and/or substance abuse issues related to their service in our Armed Forces.

VTC is voluntary. A veteran cannot be assigned to Veterans Court. Not every veteran is eligible. Certain crimes, such as Off Grid Offenses, offenses involving serious bodily harm or death, and drive-by shootings will disqualify a veteran from the program. Additionally, the veteran must be found to be in need of treatment for either mental health or substance abuse issues, or both. Veteran status alone does not qualify a person for VTC.

Every veteran that has graduated the program has not had further contact with the criminal justice system. Attached to my testimony is the brochure that describes more about VTC.

Thank you for taking the time to hear this bill. The Johnson County Sheriff's Office would ask that you find the bill favorable for passage.

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#### Incentives

The court may reward progress with the following:

- Court-announced perfect compliance list
  - Fish bowl prizes
- Special events, sports, and concert tickets
  - Praise from Judge and the VTC Team
    - Advancement to next phase
      - Fewer court appearances
- Called first in court and leave early
  - Adjust curfew
- Allow travel privileges
- Graduation ceremony
- Honor Squad

#### Sanctions

The court may sanction program violations with the following:

- Reprimand from the Judge
  - Therapeutic Intervention
- Letter of apology to the Court
  - Community Service
- Increased court appearances
  - Adjust curfew
- Electronic monitoring at participant's expense
  - Increased alcohol and drug testing
    Increased reporting to Supervision Office
- Increased reporting to Supervision Officer Lengthen time in program or phase
- Jail sanction for up to 72 hours
  - Termination from the court

## Program Fees

Diversion Application: Misdemeanor -\$30.00; Felony- \$50.00

Diversion Fee:

Misdemeanor - \$100.00; Felony - \$150.00

Court Costs: Misdemeanor (non-DUI) - \$159.50; Felony -

Additional Program Costs may include, but are not limited to: statutory fines, fingerprinting, bond supervision, urinalysis testing, lab fees, witness fees, transportation costs, court appointed attorney's fees, and restitution. Such additional costs will be made part of the defendant's VTC Diversion contract or Probation/PIS order.

### Graduation

Upon satisfaction of the requirements of the Veterans Treatment Court, the successful participant will graduate in a ceremony conducted in court. Successful VTC Diversion Track participants will have their charges/cases dismissed. VTC Probation/PIS participants will have their cases closed successfully.

## Confidentiality

The participant's treatment information shall be protected consistent with Federal Regulations and State Law during the screening process and while engaged in treatment in the Veterans Treatment Court. During the participant's initial assessment and treatment planning session, they will be asked to sign a release of information (ROI). This document allows the VA Medical Center, Johnson County Mental Health, or other appropriate treatment providers to inform the Court of a participant's initial eligibility and ongoing progress in fulfilling program requirements. Failure to sign an ROI could result in a participant's inability to participate and/or termination from the Veterans Treatment Court.

### Conclusion

The Veterans Treatment Court is designed to help participants live in the community as a productive and responsible citizen. The Judge, the Court Staff, and Treatment Team will guide and assist them, however, the final responsibility rests with the veteran participant.
