[^] The Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA) provides a temporary 6.2% increase to the FMAP for the duration of the federal public health emergency. The increase became effective on January 1, 2020 and will extend through the quarter in which the public health emergency ends. As of December 2020, the current public health emergency extends through January of 2021, causing the increase to be in effect through March of 2021.
