Re:	Prison Bed Impact Assessment, HB 2153 - Increasing the criminal penalty for
	mistreatment of a dependent adult or elder person when the victim is a
	resident of an adult care home.

## IMPACT ASSESSMENT

- Impact on Prison Admissions: This bill would result in 1 to 2 additional prison admissions each year during the forecast period.
- Impact on Prison Beds: This bill would result in 1 to 2 additional prison beds in FY 2022 and 1 to 3 additional prison beds in FY 2031.
- Impact on the Workload of the Commission: This bill would result in 2 to 4 additional journal entries each year for the workload of the Commission.

#### SUMMARY OF THE BILL

**Section 1.** K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 21-5417(b)(1) is amended to include language that mistreatment (infliction of physical injury, unreasonable confinement, or unreasonable punishment) of a dependent adult or an elder person who is a resident of an adult care home is a **severity level 2**, **person felony**. Currently, the crime is a **severity level 5**, **person felony**.

Also, K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 21-5417(b)(3) is amended to add omission or deprivation of treatment, goods or services that are necessary to maintain physical or mental health of such dependent adult or elder person who is a resident of an adult care home is a **severity level 5**, **person felony**. Currently, the crime is a **severity level 8**, **person felony**.

#### **KEY ASSUMPTIONS**

• Projected admission to prison for the target offender is assumed to increase by an annual average of 1.0% in FY 2022 and 1.5.% from FY 2023 to FY 2031, which is the same percentage used in relation to the baseline prison population forecast produced in August 2020 by the Kansas Sentencing Commission.

- Scenario One: It is assumed that two additional offenders will be convicted of the crime as defined in subsection (b)(1)(A) or (b)(1)(B) each year with one sentenced to probation and one sentenced to prison.
- Scenario Two: It is assumed that three additional offenders will be convicted of the crime as defined in subsection (b)(1)(A) or (b)(1)(B)each year with two sentenced to probation and one sentenced to prison.
- Scenario Three: It is assumed that four additional offenders will be convicted of the crime as defined in subsection (b)(1)(A) or (b)(1)() each year with two sentenced to probation and two sentenced to prison.
- The average length of sentence is assumed to be **102 months for severity level two crimes**.
- The average length of sentence is assumed to be **28 months for severity level five crimes**. This was the actual length of the prison sentence imposed for offenders admitted to prison for mistreatment of a dependent adult or an elder person at severity level 5 in FY 2020.
- It is assumed that the effective date is on July 1, 2021.

## FINDINGS

- In FY 2019, **28** offenders were convicted of the crime of mistreatment of a dependent adult.
- **Two** were sentenced to prison and **26** were sentenced to probation. The following chart breaks down the specific conviction by severity level:

- In FY 2020, five offenders were admitted to prison.
  - Two new court commitments
  - Three probation condition violators.

#### IMPACT ASSESSMENT

- Scenario One: If two offenders are convicted of the crime as defined in subsection (b)(1)(A) or (b)(1)(B) each year with one sentenced to probation and one sentenced to prison, by:
  - FY 2022, 1 prison bed would be needed; and
  - FY 2031, 2 prison beds would be needed.
- Scenario Two: If three offenders are convicted of the crime as defined in subsection (b)(1)(A) or (b)(1)(B) each year with two sentenced to probation and one sentenced to prison, by:
  - $\circ~$  FY 2022, 1 prison bed would be needed; and
  - FY 2031, 2 prison beds would be needed.
- Scenario Three: If four offenders are convicted of the crime as defined in subsection (b)(1)(A) or (b)(1)(B) each year with two sentenced to probation and two sentenced to prison, by:
  - FY 2022, 2 prison beds would be needed; and
  - FY 2031, 3 prison beds would be needed.

#### SUMMARY

- Impact on Prison Admissions: This bill would result in 1 to 2 additional prison admissions each year during the forecast period.
- Impact on Prison Beds: This bill would result in 1 to 2 additional prison beds in FY 2022 and 1 to 3 additional prison beds in FY 2031.
- Impact on the Workload of the Commission: This bill would result in 2 to 4 additional journal entries each year for the workload of the Commission.
