SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 2161 by House Committee on Health and Human Services

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2161 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

HB 2161 would amend existing law concerning the Kansas Board of Cosmetology. The bill would:

- 1. Change the agency name to the Kansas Board of Cosmetology, Body Art and Tanning in order to include all professions licensed by the Board;
- 2. Allow the Board to provide reciprocity to manicurists and ease reciprocity requirements for the cosmetology professions;
- 3. Establish charitable event and demonstration permits;
- 4. Clarify the wording for the reinstatement fee;
- 5. Set the time limit for temporary permit expiration;
- 6. Establish temporary permit expiration and apprentice licensing requirements;
- 7. Provide the Board disciplinary authority for unlicensed body art practice and for employing or allowing unlicensed practice;
- 8. Establish Kansas Administrative Procedure Act authority for the body art and tanning professions and allow for hearing reimbursements; and
- 9. Increase the limitations on a number of agency fees.

According to the Board of Cosmetology, enactment of HB 2161 could result in additional revenues of \$5,280 per fiscal year beginning in FY 2022. This estimate is based on issuance of two demonstration permits per month and two charitable event permits per month at a maximum cost of \$150 per demonstration permit and \$70 per charitable event permit ($$150 \times 24 = $3,600 + $70 \times 24 = $1,680$). The agency indicates that office staff and field staff would each spend about 30 minutes processing these permits for a total of 48 hours of processing per fiscal year. The cost for the staff time to process the permits would be expected to be no more than \$1,000 and the cost to administer other changes contained in the bill could be handled within existing resources. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2161 is not reflected in *The FY 2022 Governor's Budget Report*.
