AN ACT concerning education; relating to <u>civies</u> {courses of} instruction; 1 requiring-students to pass a civics examination *and a personal* 2 3 *financial literacy course*} for high school graduation; amending K.S.A. 4 72-3217 {and 72-3236} and repealing the existing section {sections}.

WHEREAS, To cultivate a commitment to civic participation and 6 7 to become active members of communities, students need regular 8 opportunities to engage in civic learning activities; and

9 WHEREAS, Opportunities for civic engagement must be part of a 10 systematic approach that includes the school, classrooms, teachers and students; and 11

12 WHEREAS, The legislature supports the civic advocacy network 13 established by the state board of education as a way to recognize 14 exemplary schools and school districts that have made civic 15 engagement an integral part of the school culture; and

16 WHEREAS. The state board of education discontinued the 60-item 17 objective history, government and social studies assessment and implemented a subjective performance task assessment; and 18

19 WHEREAS. To assist with future educational policies designed to 20 promote and enhance civics education in schools, some objective 21 measurable results are necessary to assess whether all students are 22 receiving basic civics knowledge and skills; and

WHEREAS, A free and publicly available civics practice test 23 24 consisting of 20 multiple choice questions that school districts and 25 educators may use to implement the provisions of this act can be 26 accessed through the United States citizenship and immigration 27 services website at https://my.uscis.gov/prep/test/civics. 28

Now. therefore:

29 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:*

30 Section 1. K.S.A. 72-3217 is hereby amended to read as follows: 72-3217. (a) All accredited schools, public, private or parochial, shall provide 31 32 and give a complete course of instruction to all-pupils students, in civil 33 government, and United States history, and in patriotism and the duties of a citizen, suitable to the elementary grades; in addition thereto,. 34

(b) (1) All accredited high schools, public, private or parochial, shall 1 give a course of instruction concerning the government and institutions of 2 the United States, and particularly of the constitution of the United States; 3 and no. Such course of instruction shall require students to pass a 4 basic civics test, or series of tests, comprising a total of 60 questions 5 6 selected randomly from the questions of the civics examination 7 administered by the United States citizenship and immigration 8 services. Such test or tests may be administered through the multiple 9 choice civics practice tests provided online by the United States citizenship and immigration services. Any student who has not taken and 10 satisfactorily passed such course shall not be certified as having completed 11 12 the course requirements necessary for graduation from high school.

(c) (1) All students who enroll in grade nine in any accredited public,
 private or parochial high school on or after July 1, 2021, shall be required
 to pass an examination on the principles of American civics. The-

16 examination shall consist of 100 questions that are substantially similar to

17 the questions administered by the United States citizenship and-

18 immigration services to applicants for United States citizenship through-19 naturalization. Any student who does not satisfactorily pass such -

20 *examination shall not be certified as having completed the course*-

21 requirements necessary for graduation from high school.

(2) Upon request, a student may be administered the examination at
 any time after such student has enrolled in grade seven, and may take the
 examination as often as necessary to obtain a passing score. The examination may be administered as part of the instruction required under
 subsection (b).

27 (2) Each accredited high school shall submit to the state board of 28 education an annual report that provides aggregate student 29 achievement data for the basic civics testing required pursuant to this subsection. The state board shall compile such reports, prepare a 30 31 summary report and submit such report to the legislature on or before 32 January 31 of each year. All data submitted pursuant to this 33 paragraph shall comply with the provisions of the student data privacy act in K.S.A. 72-6312 et seq., and amendments thereto. 34

35 (3) The applicability of this subsection and the extent to which 36 accommodations are provided, if any, to a student with an individualized 37 education program (IEP) shall be governed by such student's IEP.

(4) The state board of education may adopt rules and regulations to
implement the provisions of this subsection, including, but not limited to,
providing a model examination for use by any school district or thegoverning body of any accredited private or parochial high school and
establishing the passing score for any such model examination.

43 {Sec. 2. K.S.A. 72-3236 is hereby amended to read as follows: 72-

1 3236. (a) In order To equip students with the knowledge and skills 2 needed to become self-supporting and to enable students to make critical 3 decisions regarding personal finances, the state board of education shall 4 authorize and assist in the implementation of programs on teaching 5 personal financial literacy.

6 (b) The state board of education shall develop a curriculum, 7 materials and guidelines that local boards of education and governing 8 authorities of accredited nonpublic schools may use in implementing to 9 implement the program of instruction on personal financial literacy. The 10 state board of education shall adopt a glossary of personal financial 11 literacy terms which shall be used by school districts when implementing 12 the program on personal financial literacy.

(c) The state board of education shall develop state curriculum
 standards for personal financial literacy, for all grade levels, for
 kindergarten and grades one through 10 within the existing mathematics
 curriculum or another appropriate subject-matter curriculum, and for
 grades 11 and 12 in accordance with subsection (d).

(d) The state board of education shall encourage school districts when
 selecting textbooks for mathematics, economics, family and consumer science, accounting or other appropriate courses, to select those textbooks
 which contain substantive provisions on personal finance, including personal budgeting, credit, debt management and other topics concerning
 personal financial literacy.

24 (e) The state board of education shall include questions relating to-25 personal financial literacy in the statewide assessments for mathematics or social studies required under K.S.A. 72-5170, and amendments thereto. 26 When the statewide assessments for mathematics or social studies are-27 reviewed or rewritten, the state board of education shall examine the-28 29 questions relating to personal financial literacy and rewrite such questions in order to determine if programs on personal financial literacy are-30 equipping students with the knowledge and skills needed to become self-31 32 supporting and enabling students to make critical decisions regardingpersonal finances. A course of instruction concerning personal financial 33 literacy shall be at least one semester or two quarters or the equivalent 34 35 thereof, and shall include, but not be limited to, the following topics:

36 (1) Saving and investing, including, but not limited to, understanding
 37 investments, wealth building and college savings;

(2) credit and debt, including, but not limited to, topics concerning
the dangers of excessive debt, consumer awareness, credit bureaus,
payday and car title loans and collection practices;

42 not limited to, topics concerning budgeting and negotiating techniques;

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(4) insurance, risk management and income, including, but not 1 limited to, topics concerning insurance coverage, taxes, real estate rent or 2 *purchase options, mortgages and automobile and personal loans.*} Sec.<u>2.</u> {3.} K.S.A. 72-3217<u>is</u> {and 72-3236 are} hereby repealed. Sec.<u>3.</u> {4.} This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its 3
