1 AN ACT concerning public records; relating to disclosure thereof under
2 the open records act; making permanent certain exceptions to
3 disclosure; amending K.S.A. 75-5664 and 75-5665 and K.S.A. 2020
4 Supp. 9-513c, 9-2209, 12-5374, 16-335, 17-1312e, 25-2309, 40-2,118,
5 40-4913, 45-229 and 45-254 and repealing the existing sections.

7 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:*

8 Section 1. K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 9-513c is hereby amended to read as
9 follows: 9-513c. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, all
10 information or reports obtained and prepared by the commissioner in the
11 course of licensing or examining a person engaged in money transmission
12 business shall be confidential and may not be disclosed by the
13 commissioner except as provided in subsection (c) or (d).

14 (b) All confidential information shall be the property of the state of
15 Kansas and shall not be subject to disclosure except upon the written
16 approval of the state bank commissioner.

17 (c) (1) The commissioner shall have the authority to share
18 supervisory information, including reports of examinations, with other
19 state or federal agencies having regulatory authority over the person's
20 money transmission business and shall have the authority to conduct joint
21 examinations with other regulatory agencies.

22 (2) The requirements under any federal or state law regarding the
23 confidentiality of any information or material provided to the nationwide
24 multi-state licensing system, and any privilege arising under federal or
25 state law, including the rules of any federal or state court, with respect to
26 such information or material, shall continue to apply to such information
27 or material after the information or material has been disclosed to the
28 system. Such information and material may be shared with all state and
29 federal regulatory officials with financial services industry oversight
30 authority without the loss of confidentiality protections provided by
31 federal and state laws.

32 (d) The commissioner may provide for the release of information to
33 law enforcement agencies or prosecutorial agencies or offices who shall
34 maintain the confidentiality of the information.

35 (e) The commissioner may accept a report of examination or
36 investigation from another state or federal licensing agency, in which the

1 accepted report is an official report of the commissioner. Acceptance of an
2 examination or investigation report does not waive any fee required by this
3 act.

4 (f) Nothing shall prohibit the commissioner from releasing to the
5 public a list of persons licensed or their agents or from releasing
6 aggregated financial data on such persons.

7 ~~(g) The provisions of subsection (a) shall expire on July 1, 2021,~~
8 ~~unless the legislature acts to reauthorize such provisions. The provisions of~~
9 ~~subsection (a) shall be reviewed by the legislature prior to July 1, 2021.~~

10 Sec. 2. K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 9-2209 is hereby amended to read as
11 follows: 9-2209. (a) The commissioner may exercise the following
12 powers:

13 (1) Adopt rules and regulations as necessary to carry out the intent
14 and purpose of this act and to implement the requirements of applicable
15 federal law;

16 (2) make investigations and examinations of the licensee's or
17 registrant's operations, books and records as the commissioner deems
18 necessary for the protection of the public and control access to any
19 documents and records of the licensee or registrant under examination or
20 investigation;

21 (3) charge reasonable costs of investigation, examination and
22 administration of this act, to be paid by the applicant, licensee or
23 registrant. The commissioner shall establish such fees in such amounts as
24 the commissioner may determine to be sufficient to meet the budget
25 requirements of the commissioner for each fiscal year. Charges for
26 administration of this act shall be based on the licensee's loan volume;

27 (4) order any licensee or registrant to cease any activity or practice
28 ~~which~~ that the commissioner deems to be deceptive, dishonest, violative of
29 state or federal law or unduly harmful to the interests of the public;

30 (5) exchange any information regarding the administration of this act
31 with any agency of the United States or any state ~~which~~ that regulates the
32 licensee or registrant or administers statutes, rules and regulations or
33 programs related to mortgage business and to enter into information
34 sharing arrangements with other governmental agencies or associations
35 representing governmental agencies ~~which~~ that are deemed necessary or
36 beneficial to the administration of this act;

37 (6) disclose to any person or entity that an applicant's, licensee's or
38 registrant's application, license or registration has been denied, suspended,
39 revoked or refused renewal;

40 (7) require or permit any person to file a written statement, under oath
41 or otherwise as the commissioner may direct, setting forth all the facts and
42 circumstances concerning any apparent violation of this act, or any rule
43 and regulation promulgated thereunder or any order issued pursuant to this

1 act;

2 (8) receive, as a condition in settlement of any investigation or
3 examination, a payment designated for consumer education to be
4 expended for such purpose as directed by the commissioner;

5 (9) require that any applicant, registrant, licensee or other person
6 successfully passes a standardized examination designed to establish such
7 person's knowledge of mortgage business transactions and all applicable
8 state and federal law. Such examinations shall be created and administered
9 by the commissioner or the commissioner's designee, and may be made a
10 condition of application approval or application renewal;

11 (10) require that any applicant, licensee, registrant or other person
12 complete a minimum number of prelicensing education hours and
13 complete continuing education hours on an annual basis. Prelicensing and
14 continuing education courses shall be approved by the commissioner, or
15 the commissioner's designee, and may be made a condition of application
16 approval and renewal;

17 (11) require fingerprinting of any applicant, registrant, licensee,
18 members thereof if a copartnership or association, or officers and directors
19 thereof if a corporation, or any agent acting on their behalf, or other person
20 as deemed appropriate by the commissioner. The commissioner or the
21 commissioner's designee, may submit such fingerprints to the Kansas
22 bureau of investigation, federal bureau of investigation or other law
23 enforcement agency for the purposes of verifying the identity of such
24 persons and obtaining records of their criminal arrests and convictions. For
25 the purposes of this section and in order to reduce the points of contact
26 ~~which~~ *that* the federal bureau of investigation may have to maintain with
27 the individual states, the commissioner may use the nationwide mortgage
28 licensing system and registry as a channeling agent for requesting
29 information from and distributing information to the department of justice
30 or any governmental agency;

31 (12) refer such evidence as may be available concerning any violation
32 of this act or of any rule and regulation or order hereunder to the attorney
33 general, or in consultation with the attorney general to the proper county or
34 district attorney, who may in such prosecutor's discretion, with or without
35 such a referral, institute the appropriate criminal proceedings under the
36 laws of this state;

37 (13) issue and apply to enforce subpoenas in this state at the request
38 of a comparable official of another state if the activities constituting an
39 alleged violation for which the information is sought would be a violation
40 of the Kansas mortgage business act if the activities had occurred in this
41 state;

42 (14) use the nationwide mortgage licensing system and registry as a
43 channeling agent for requesting and distributing any information regarding

1 loan originator or mortgage company licensing to and from any source so
2 directed by the commissioner;

3 (15) establish relationships or contracts with the nationwide mortgage
4 licensing system and registry or other entities to collect and maintain
5 records and process transaction fees or other fees related to applicants,
6 licensees, registrants or other persons subject to this act and to take such
7 other actions as may be reasonably necessary to participate in the
8 nationwide mortgage licensing system and registry. The commissioner
9 shall regularly report violations of law, as well as enforcement actions and
10 other relevant information to the nationwide mortgage licensing system
11 and registry;

12 (16) require any licensee or registrant to file reports with the
13 nationwide mortgage licensing system and registry in the form prescribed
14 by the commissioner or the commissioner's designee;

15 (17) receive and act on complaints, take action designed to obtain
16 voluntary compliance with the provisions of the Kansas mortgage business
17 act or commence proceedings on the commissioner's own initiative;

18 (18) provide guidance to persons and groups on their rights and duties
19 under the Kansas mortgage business act;

20 (19) enter into any informal agreement with any mortgage company
21 for a plan of action to address violations of law. The adoption of an
22 informal agreement authorized by this paragraph shall not be subject to the
23 provisions of K.S.A. 77-501 et seq., and amendments thereto, or K.S.A.
24 77-601 et seq., and amendments thereto. Any informal agreement
25 authorized by this paragraph shall not be considered an order or other
26 agency action, and shall be considered confidential examination material
27 pursuant to K.S.A. 9-2217, and amendments thereto. All such examination
28 material shall also be confidential by law and privileged, shall not be
29 subject to the open records act, K.S.A. 45-215 et seq., and amendments
30 thereto, shall not be subject to subpoena and shall not be subject to
31 discovery or admissible in evidence in any private civil action. ~~The~~
32 ~~provisions of this paragraph shall expire on July 1, 2021, unless the~~
33 ~~legislature reviews and reenacts this provision pursuant to K.S.A. 45-229,~~
34 ~~and amendments thereto, prior to July 1, 2021; and~~

35 (20) issue, amend and revoke written administrative guidance
36 documents in accordance with the applicable provisions of the Kansas
37 administrative procedure act.

38 (b) For the purpose of any examination, investigation or proceeding
39 under this act, the commissioner or any officer designated by the
40 commissioner may administer oaths and affirmations, subpoena witnesses,
41 compel such witnesses' attendance, adduce evidence and require the
42 production of any matter ~~which~~ *that* is relevant to the examination or
43 investigation, including the existence, description, nature, custody,

1 condition and location of any books, documents or other tangible things
2 and the identity and location of persons having knowledge of relevant
3 facts, or any other matter reasonably calculated to lead to the discovery of
4 relevant information or items.

5 (c) In case of contumacy by, or refusal to obey a subpoena issued to
6 any person, any court of competent jurisdiction, upon application by the
7 commissioner, may issue to that person an order requiring the person to
8 appear before the commissioner, or the officer designated by the
9 commissioner, there, to produce documentary evidence if so ordered or to
10 give evidence touching the matter under investigation or in question. Any
11 failure to obey the order of the court may be punished by the court as a
12 contempt of court.

13 (d) No person is excused from attending and testifying or from
14 producing any document or record before the commissioner or in
15 obedience to the subpoena of the commissioner or any officer designated
16 by the commissioner or in any proceeding instituted by the commissioner,
17 on the ground that the testimony or evidence, documentary or otherwise,
18 required of the person may tend to incriminate the person or subject the
19 person to a penalty or forfeiture. No individual may be prosecuted or
20 subjected to any penalty or forfeiture for or on account of any transaction,
21 matter or thing concerning which such person is compelled, after claiming
22 privilege against self-incrimination, to testify or produce evidence,
23 documentary or otherwise, except that the individual so testifying shall not
24 be exempt from prosecution and punishment for perjury committed in so
25 testifying.

26 (e) Except for refund of an excess charge, no liability is imposed
27 under the Kansas mortgage business act for an act done or omitted in
28 conformity with a rule and regulation or written administrative
29 interpretation of the commissioner in effect at the time of the act or
30 omission, notwithstanding that after the act or omission, the rule and
31 regulation or written administrative interpretation may be determined by
32 judicial or other authority to be invalid for any reason.

33 Sec. 3. K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 12-5374 is hereby amended to read as
34 follows: 12-5374. (a) (1) Except for the amounts withheld by the LCPA
35 pursuant to K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 12-5368(b), and amendments thereto, and
36 any amounts withheld pursuant to K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 12-5364(l), and
37 amendments thereto, not later than 30 days after the receipt of moneys
38 from providers pursuant to K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 12-5370 and 12-5371, and
39 amendments thereto, and the department pursuant to K.S.A. 2020 Supp.
40 12-5372, and amendments thereto, the LCPA shall distribute such moneys
41 to the PSAPs. The amount of money distributed to the PSAPs in each
42 county shall be based upon the amount of 911 fees collected from service
43 users located in that county, based on place of primary use information

11 (2) There shall be a minimum county distribution of \$60,000 and no
 12 county shall receive less than \$60,000 of direct distribution moneys. If
 13 there is more than one PSAP in a county then the direct distribution
 14 allocated to that county by population shall be deducted from the
 15 minimum county distribution and the difference shall be proportionately
 16 divided between the PSAPs in the county. All moneys remaining after
 17 distribution, moneys withheld pursuant to K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 12-5368(b)
 18 (1), and amendments thereto, and any moneys that cannot be attributed to
 19 a specific PSAP shall be transferred to the 911 operations fund.

20 (b) All fees remitted to the LCPA shall be deposited in the 911 state
 21 fund and for the purposes of this act be treated as if they are public funds,
 22 pursuant to article 14 of chapter 9 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, and
 23 amendments thereto.

24 (c) All moneys in the 911 state fund that have been collected from the
 25 prepaid wireless 911 fee shall be deposited in the 911 operations fund
 26 unless \$3 million of such moneys have been deposited in any given year
 27 then all remaining moneys shall be distributed to the counties in an amount
 28 proportional to each county's population as a percentage share of the
 29 population of the state. For each PSAP within a county, such moneys shall
 30 be distributed to each PSAP in an amount proportional to the PSAP's
 31 population as a percentage share of the population of the county. If there is
 32 no PSAP within a county, then such moneys shall be distributed to the
 33 PSAP providing service to such county. Such moneys distributed to
 34 counties and PSAPs only shall be used for the uses authorized in K.S.A.
 35 2020 Supp. 12-5375, and amendments thereto.

36 (d) The LCPA shall keep accurate accounts of all receipts and
 37 disbursements of moneys from the 911 fees.

38 (e) Information provided by providers to the local collection point
 39 administrator or to the 911 coordinating council pursuant to this act will be
 40 treated as proprietary records ~~which~~ that will be withheld from the public
 41 upon request of the party submitting such records.

1 follows: 16-335. (a) Except as provided by this section, all information

 4 reporting by the cemetery corporation or the trustee, shall be deemed to be
 5 confidential information; and shall not be disclosed by the secretary of
 6 state; *or* any assistant, examiner or employee thereof, except to:

7 (1) Officers and the members of the board of directors of the
 8 cemetery corporation being audited;

9 (2) the attorney general, when in the opinion of the secretary of state
 10 the same should be disclosed; and

24 follows: 17-1312e. (a) Except as provided by this section, all information
 25 ~~which~~ *that* the secretary of state shall gather or record in making an
 26 investigation and examination of any cemetery corporation, or the
 27 reporting by the cemetery corporation or the trustee, shall be deemed to be
 28 confidential information; and shall not be disclosed by the secretary of
 29 state; *or* any assistant, examiner or employee thereof, except to:

30 (1) Officers and the members of the board of directors of the
 31 cemetery corporation being audited;

32 (2) the attorney general, when in the opinion of the secretary of state
 33 the same should be disclosed; and

1 Sec. 6. K.S.A. 2020 Supp. 25-2309 is hereby amended to read as
 2 follows: 25-2309. (a) Any person may apply in person, by mail, through a
 3 voter registration agency, or by other delivery to a county election officer
 4 to be registered. Such application shall be made on: (1) A form approved
 5 by the secretary of state, ~~which~~ *and such form* shall be provided by a
 6 county election officer or chief state election official upon request in
 7 person, by telephone or in writing; or (2) the national mail voter
 8 registration form issued pursuant to federal law.

9 Such application shall be signed by the applicant under penalty of
 10 perjury and shall contain the original signature of the applicant or the
 11 computerized, electronic or digitized transmitted signature of the
 12 applicant. A signature may be made by mark, initials, typewriter, print,
 13 stamp, symbol or any other manner if by placing the signature on the
 14 document the person intends the signature to be binding. A signature may
 15 be made by another person at the voter's direction if the signature reflects
 16 such voter's intention.

17 (b) Applications made under this section shall give voter eligibility
 18 requirements and such information as is necessary to prevent duplicative
 19 voter registrations and enable the relevant election officer to assess the
 20 eligibility of the applicant and to administer voter registration, including,
 21 but not limited to, the following data to be kept by the relevant election
 22 officer as provided by law:

- 23 (1) Name;
- 24 (2) place of residence, including specific address or location, and
- 25 mailing address if the residence address is not a permissible postal address;
- 26 (3) date of birth;
- 27 (4) sex;
- 28 (5) the last four digits of the person's social security number or the
- 29 person's full driver's license or nondriver's identification card number;
- 30 (6) telephone number, if available;
- 31 (7) naturalization data ~~(, if applicable)~~;
- 32 (8) if applicant has previously registered or voted elsewhere,
- 33 residence at time of last registration or voting;
- 34 (9) when present residence established;
- 35 (10) name under which applicant last registered or voted, if different
- 36 from present name;
- 37 (11) an attestation that the applicant meets each eligibility
- 38 requirement;
- 39 (12) a statement that the penalty for submission of a false voter
- 40 registration application is a maximum presumptive sentence of 17 months
- 41 in prison;
- 42 (13) a statement that, if an applicant declines to register to vote, the
- 43 fact that the applicant has declined to register will remain confidential and

1 will be used only for voter registration purposes;

2 (14) a statement that if an applicant does register to vote, the office to
3 which a voter registration application is submitted will remain confidential
4 and will be used only for voter registration purposes;

5 (15) boxes for the applicant to check to indicate whether the applicant
6 is or is not a citizen of the United States, together with the question "Are
7 you a citizen of the United States of America?";

8 (16) boxes for the county election officer or chief state election
9 official to check to indicate whether the applicant has provided with the
10 application the information necessary to assess the eligibility of the
11 applicant, including such applicant's United States citizenship;

12 (17) boxes for the applicant to check to indicate whether or not the
13 applicant will be 18 years of age or older on election day, together with the
14 question "Will you be 18 years of age on or before election day?";

15 (18) in reference to paragraphs (15) and (17) the statement "If you
16 checked 'no' in response to either of these questions, do not complete this
17 form.";

18 (19) a statement that the applicant shall be required to provide
19 identification when voting; and

20 (20) political party affiliation declaration, if any. An applicant's
21 failure to make a declaration will result in the applicant being registered as
22 an unaffiliated voter.

23 If the application discloses any previous registration in any other
24 county or state, as indicated by paragraph (8) or (10), or otherwise, the
25 county election officer shall upon the registration of the applicant, give
26 notice to the election official of the place of former registration, notifying
27 such official of applicant's present residence and registration, and
28 authorizing cancellation of such former registration. This section shall be
29 interpreted and applied in accordance with federal law. No eligible
30 applicant whose qualifications have been assessed shall be denied
31 registration.

32 (c) Any person who applies for registration through a voter
33 registration agency shall be provided with, in addition to the application
34 under subsection (b), a form ~~which~~ *that* includes:

35 (1) The question "If you are not registered to vote where you live
36 now, would you like to apply to register to vote here today?";

37 (2) a statement that if the applicant declines to register to vote, this
38 decision will remain confidential and be used only for voter registration
39 purposes;

40 (3) a statement that if the applicant does register to vote, information
41 regarding the office to which the application was submitted will remain
42 confidential and be used only for voter registration purposes; and

43 (4) if the agency provides public assistance: (i) The statement

1 "Applying to register or declining to register to vote will not affect the
2 amount of assistance that you will be provided by this agency.";

3 (ii) boxes for the applicant to check to indicate whether the applicant
4 would like to register or declines to register to vote, together with the
5 statement "IF YOU DO NOT CHECK EITHER BOX, YOU WILL BE
6 CONSIDERED TO HAVE DECIDED NOT TO REGISTER TO VOTE
7 AT THIS TIME.";

8 (iii) the statement "If you would like help in filling out the voter
9 registration application form, we will help you. The decision whether to
10 seek or accept help is yours. You may fill out the application form in
11 private."; and

12 (iv) the statement "If you believe that someone has interfered with
13 your right to register or to decline to register to vote, your right to privacy
14 in deciding whether to register or in applying to register to vote, or your
15 right to choose your own political party or other political preference, you
16 may file a complaint with the Kansas Secretary of State."

17 (d) If any person, in writing, declines to register to vote, the voter
18 registration agency shall maintain the form prescribed by subsection (c).

19 (e) A voter registration agency shall transmit the completed
20 registration application to the county election officer not later than five
21 days after the date of acceptance. Upon receipt of an application for
22 registration, the county election officer shall send, by nonforwardable
23 mail, a notice of disposition of the application to the applicant at the postal
24 delivery address shown on the application. If a notice of disposition is
25 returned as undeliverable, a confirmation mailing prescribed by K.S.A. 25-
26 2316c, and amendments thereto, shall occur.

27 (f) If an application is received while registration is closed, such
28 application shall be considered to have been received on the next
29 following day during which registration is open.

30 (g) A person who completes an application for voter registration shall
31 be considered a registered voter when the county election officer adds the
32 applicant's name to the county voter registration list.

33 (h) Any registered voter whose residence address is not a permissible
34 postal delivery address shall designate a postal address for registration
35 records. When a county election officer has reason to believe that a voter's
36 registration residence is not a permissible postal delivery address, the
37 county election officer shall attempt to determine a proper mailing address
38 for the voter.

39 (i) Any registered voter may request that such person's residence
40 address be concealed from public inspection on the voter registration list
41 and on the original voter registration application form. Such request shall
42 be made in writing to the county election officer, and shall specify a
43 clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy or a threat to the voter's

1 safety. Upon receipt of such a request, the county election officer shall take
2 appropriate steps to ensure that such person's residence address is not
3 publicly disclosed. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed as
4 requiring or authorizing the secretary of state to include on the voter
5 registration application form a space or other provision on the form that
6 would allow the applicant to request that such applicant's residence
7 address be concealed from public inspection.

8 (j) No application for voter registration shall be made available for
9 public inspection or copying unless the information required by subsection
10 (b)(5) has been removed or otherwise rendered unreadable.

11 (k) If an applicant fails to answer the question prescribed in
12 subsection (b)(15), the county election officer shall send the application to
13 the applicant at the postal delivery address given on the application, by
14 nonforwardable mail, with a notice of incompleteness. The notice shall
15 specify a period of time during which the applicant may complete the
16 application in accordance with K.S.A. 25-2311, and amendments thereto,
17 and be eligible to vote in the next election.

18 (l) The county election officer or secretary of state's office shall
19 accept any completed application for registration, but an applicant shall
20 not be registered until the applicant has provided satisfactory evidence of
21 United States citizenship. Evidence of United States citizenship as
22 required in this section will be satisfied by presenting one of the
23 documents listed in ~~subsections~~ subsection (l)(1) through (l)(13) in person
24 at the time of filing the application for registration or by including a
25 photocopy of one of the following documents with a mailed registration
26 application. After a person has submitted satisfactory evidence of
27 citizenship, the county election officer shall indicate this information in the
