## SUPPLEMENTAL NOTE ON HOUSE BILL NO. 2167

## As Recommended by House Committee on <u>Transportation</u>

#### **Brief\***

HB 2167 would add two exceptions to law requiring a license plate to be attached to the rear of a motor vehicle. The bill would allow concrete mixer trucks the option to display a license plate on the front of the vehicle rather than on the rear of the vehicle and would require a dump truck with a gross weight of 26,000 pounds or more to display a license plate on the front of the vehicle.

The bill would also require a law enforcement officer to issue a warning citation to anyone in violation of the new dump truck license plate location requirement until January 1, 2022.

# **Background**

HB 2167 was introduced by the House Committee on Transportation at the request of Representative Proehl.

## House Committee on Transportation

In the House Committee hearing, representatives of the American Concrete Company, Inc., the Kansas Motor Carriers Association, and the Kansas Ready Mixed Concrete Association provided **proponent** testimony.

Proponents stated having the option to display a license plate on the front of a concrete mixer truck would decrease instances of the license plate being damaged or lost, and fewer replacement plates would need to be purchased as a result. Proponents also stated the bill would release dump truck operators from a Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration safety regulation requiring a working light on a rear-mounted license plate.

No other testimony was provided.

## **Fiscal Information**

According to the fiscal note prepared by the Division of the Budget on the bill, the Department of Revenue indicates the bill would have no fiscal effect on the agency.
