## **SUPPLEMENTAL NOTE ON HOUSE BILL NO. 2248**

As Recommended by House Committee on Social Services Budget

#### **Brief\***

HB 2248 would update statutes related to the distribution of state financial assistance to local health departments. The bill would increase the amount received by local health departments, upon application, to \$15,000, if the allocation of total state financial assistance for the applicable fiscal year is \$3.0 million or greater, subject to appropriation. If the total state financial assistance for the fiscal year is less than \$3.0 million, each local health department, upon application, would receive \$7,000, subject to appropriation.

# **Background**

The bill was introduced by the House Committee on Appropriations at the request of Representative Will Carpenter.

## House Committee on Social Services Budget

In the House Committee hearing, a representative of the Kansas Association of Local Health Departments provided **proponent** testimony, stating the minimum amount of \$7,000 has not been adjusted since 1992, and the update is an important step in supporting local health departments to provide quality services.

Written-only **proponent** testimony was provided by representatives of the Edwards County Health Department, Geary County Health Department, Hamilton County Health Department, Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE), Kansas Public Health Association, McPherson County Health Department, Ness County Health Department, Pratt County Health Department, and Wilson County Health Department.

No other testimony was provided.

## Fiscal Information

According to the fiscal note prepared by the Division of the Budget on the bill, KDHE indicates increasing the minimum state financial assistance to local health departments could not be accomplished within existing agency resources. The bill does not appropriate additional resources from the State General Fund. Both KDHE and the Kansas Association of Counties note the bill would primarily affect county governments. Any fiscal effect associated with enactment of the bill is not reflected in *The FY 2022 Governor's Budget Report*.
